College Street Presbyterians. The annual reports of College-street Presbyterian Church showed that the past year was exceedingly successful. The total income was over \$12,200, of which \$1000 was contributed by the Sabbath school and \$3000 for foreign missions. A balance of over \$700 remains with current expenses paid, \$1000 paid off mortgage and \$700 against floating debt. The membership is now 1066, and the increase was larger than for any previous year. Expenses have been heavy, the church having supported a mission-burial in India and one in the Northwest, and during the past eight months the woman in St. John's Ward. The board of management was increased from fifteen to eighteen members, and the new members elected were: James J. Macdonald, J. E. H. Thayer, J. H. Hancock, Dr. J. E. Rhind, James A. Peterson, J. M. The cornerstone of the new edifice was laid by Miss Jean Gordon on April 22 last. Last night, at the annual meeting, Rev. G. R. Fraser, the pastor, presided. General fund, \$23.74; Sunday school, \$127.74; missions, \$127.74; scholars on roll, 400; average attendance 262; teachers and officers 41; gifts to the church, \$127.74; for auxiliary and foreign missions the gifts amounted to \$46.
