RUSSIA AGAIN COERCED SOCIALIST LEADERS MAY BE SUSPENDED SERIOUS POLITICAL CRISIS

Lower House Rejects Premier Stolypin's Ultimatum, But Suspension of Sixteen of the Leaders May Soon Follow.

POLICE TAKE POSSESSION OF LODGINGS AND PAPERS

ST. PETERSBURG, June 14.—The dissolution of the lower house of the Russian parliament appears to-day to be a question of only a few hours, or at most of a day or two. With only 120 opposing votes, the lower house to-night, rejected Premier Stolypin's ultimatum for the immediate suspension of fifty-five deputies for membership in the Social Democratic party, and referred the subject to a committee. Although the committee has been instructed to report to-morrow evening, it is known in advance that the decision on the main question will be adverse, and that the Duma will accept the recommendation.

PEACE ENVOYS NOW AT HAGUE

Will Start Discussion of International Issues To-day — Netherland's Capital En Fete.

THE HAGUE, June 14.—With the representatives of forty-six countries gathered here for the opening of the second peace conference to-morrow, there is a remarkable contrast between the sentiments prevailing upon the eve of the original conference of 1899 and to-day. This has become a subject of general comment. In 1899, although less than half the present number of governments were represented, the hopes of the world were high, and there was a vision of disarmament and the banishment of war from among civilized peoples. Men who were here eight years ago recall how the delegates of the powers met in response to the appeal of the Emperor of Russia and entered upon their work with the enthusiasm of men upon a holy mission. Yet three months later this dream faded, and nothing beyond the adoption of a pious vow remained of the avowed object of the conference.

Specific Charges

The prosecutor then read a specific charge against Prince Tsereteli, Ozel, and fourteen other deputies. The charges against these deputies included almost every crime in the revolutionary calendar. They were all accused of being in possession of arms, passports and of making revolutionary speeches. One, M. Gorus, was charged in particular with presiding at a secret congress of the military revolutionary league.

Decision Quickly Taken

The decision of the cabinet fell like a thunderbolt on parliament, as it has been popularly supposed, that the house's action in shelving the amnesty resolution and refusing to instruct the Agrarian committee in favor of the forcible expropriation of land had averted the impending danger of a dissolution.

Antagonism Apparent

It is idle to deny that the antagonism of Great Britain and Germany overshadows the conference. The German coffee to the Hague expressly suspicions that the group of powers of which Great Britain is the backbone intend to try to maneuver her into a position where the failure to do anything in the direction of the limitation of armaments will be laid to her door. Although some aid from Italy may be expected, and Russia is not unfriendly, Germany is only sure of Austria, and she fears a trap. For instance, she is afraid of compulsory arbitration lest it compel her to submit interests which she deems vital to an immediately detrimental.

RACE GAMBLING DATE OF PEOPLE

Anglican Synod Believes It Should Be Declared Illegal—Government Commended.

"This synod is of opinion that race-track gambling should be declared illegal and urges upon the government of the Dominion the advisability of taking such steps as may be necessary to secure this end," was the form of a motion made by Canon Welch adopted at the closing session of the Anglican Synod yesterday afternoon.

"I mention race-track gambling particularly," said Canon Welch, "because this form of vice is being strongly condemned by other denominations, and the English Church desires to get in line with them. It is necessary for the law to be amended as its present form is altogether too vague. The practice of race-track gambling is productive of much degradation and misery and leads to crime of all kinds. I do not propose to deal in heroics. Clergymen meet with plenty of instances of the baneful effect of this practice in their daily work. Unprofessional gambling, especially meris condemnation. It is mainly indulged in by women, who go to the Woodbine race-track to spend enough money to buy their millinery bills. Why are these things countenanced? The well-to-do men who frequented race-track operations are not willing to pay the cost of its maintenance from their own pockets and allow bookmaking with the idea of meeting expenses this way. I understand that at the spring meet of the Ontario Jockey Club the daily returns from this source were \$2000 and that for the week's season netted \$50,000. It is a disgrace that men of high standing should be willing to pay for personal pleasures and amusements at the expense of the degradation of their fellow-men."

REV. CANON BALDWIN

The thirty-fifth anniversary of his appointment to All Saints' parish will be celebrated to-morrow. He was ordained minister in York, May 27, 1862, by the Archbishop of York, and ordained by the Bishop of Ely, in Ely Cathedral, on June 15, 1867.

THE DAY OF REST

Considerable comment centered around the report of the committee on the observance of the Lord's Day. Hon. S. H. Blake was sorry that extreme selfishness made the enactment of a law enforcing the grant of a day of rest to employees necessary. "Have we any right," he asked, "to enslave our fellow-men on steamers and railway cars and in museums and other places for our own personal pleasure?" Dr. Shearer, secretary of the Lord's Day committee, addressed the synod on the new act, stating that its partial enforcement had restored the day of rest to nearly 100,000 Canadian workmen, and that its entire observance would secure the same privilege to as many more.

FAMILY GEOGRAPHY

The report of the committee on education provoked much discussion over that section which referred to the geography text book employed in high schools. It was contended that according to the teaching of the book, that was a matter of accident, and that the revolution was made primary instead of being given its true secondary position. Hon. S. H. Hired Man Can Wash His Feet in Creek or Pond

Or if Boss Farmer Be Sympathetic He May Furnish Tub, Towels and Soap as One Etobicoke Agriculturist Did Last Night.



About 9 o'clock last night, some one, who said he was speaking from Etobicoke, telephoned the Farming Editor of The World. He said he was a hired man, and that last night after he had come in from a hard day's work in the field, and after he had had a cold supper, his boss, the farmer, called him into the woodshed, where he had a big tub of hot water, a big towel and a chunk of soap. Addressing the hired man he said: "Go darn your eyes, we'll both wash our feet," and the two of them thereupon pulled off their boots and had a good foot bath. The hired man went on further to say that the only other remark the boss made was that the newspapers "were too dang busy with other people's business, and that they'd better leave the hired man's feet alone."

AGRICULTURAL EDITOR WORLD

I am not sure that you went into hand-spraying when the hired man asked you where was he to wash his feet. You could not answer his question, nor can the farmer who answered it. My answer to this question, and I know it, I have worked on a good many farms and I have suffered a good deal in my time from the trouble of washing my feet. At times I have had to wash my feet in a horse pail in the stable and dry them as well as I could with straw; and on Sundays I have often had to take a clean pair of socks with me and go down to the creek and wash my feet there, and dry them in the sun, and often in the heat of summer there is no creek where you can wash your feet. DECLARATION OF WAR.

President Zelaya's Reply Looked Upon as Such. WASHINGTON, June 14.—What amounts to an actual declaration of war between Nicaragua and Salvador was confirmed in the reply of President Zelaya to an inquiry from Washington as to his connection with the recent capture of Salvador. The answer came to the state department today in the shape of the following telegram from American Consul-General Oliveras at Managua, the Nicaraguan capital: "I am officially informed that in accordance with the Central American Union, President Zelaya has dispatched munitions of war and troops in aid of Gen. Alfaro, who is the presidential candidate for the present election of Salvador. Figures of the nation idea."

HOUSE OF COMMONS NEEDS GOOD CLEANING

True Witness Condemns Corruption Among Prominent Ministers of Laurier Cabinet.

MONTRÉAL, June 14.—(Special.)—Things must be had indeed when such a pronounced Liberal newspaper as The True Witness, the organ of the English speaking Catholic population in this province has to declare in its headlines to-day that a house-cleaning is in order at Ottawa. This paper, which has supported the administration for several years, says: "If one-half the veiled charges and insinuations that are allowed to circulate through the political maze were then as true the sooner a house-cleaning in our national household is instituted, the better. It is all for the country and the dominant party."

PREMIER ORDERS ACTION AGAINST TWO RAILWAYS

Instructs Crown Attorney Drayton to Proceed on Charge of Criminal Negligence.

Premier Whitney yesterday instructed Crown Attorney Drayton to proceed under the criminal code against the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways on the charge of criminal negligence for not properly protecting the Bay-street crossing, and also for maintaining a nuisance at the crossing. The premier ordered that the indictments should be preferred before the next grand jury, which will meet on Sept. 19 next.

DR. FALCONER INDUCTED AS HEAD OF UNIVERSITY

After Formal Ceremony—President and Party Are Entertained by Dr. Hoskin.

A meeting of the board of governors of the University of Toronto was held yesterday afternoon to induct Dr. Falconer, the new president, into his office. The ceremony was very brief. The doctor was welcomed by Dr. Hoskin, chairman of the board, and then introduced to the other members. He formally accepted the position, and afterwards the whole party were entertained to luncheon by Dr. Hoskin at his home in Rosedale. Among the guests were Premier Whitney and Col. Matheson, provincial treasurer.

WILL NOT STRIKE

Boilermakers Averse to Joining Machinists in Labor War. Fully one-half of the members of the Boilermakers' Union, who met in Occident Hall last night to discuss the advisability of joining the machinists' strike, were averse to doing so. After the meeting lasted till early this morning, and many left with the intention of going back to work to-day.

PETTIBONE SENT MONEY LETTER TO ASSASSIN

State Presents Continuous Thread of Evidence Connecting Former's Store and Orchard.

BOISE, Idaho, June 14.—The prosecution in the Stuenkel murder trial to-day, entering in earnest on corroborative of Harry Orchard's testimony, presented a continuous thread of evidence connecting George Pettibone's store in Denver with Orchard at San Francisco, while the latter was occupied on the Bradley murder plot, partly developed the direct line by which it is hoped to show that Hayward engaged and paid Steve Adams for the same, legitimate work, and add special evidence in confirmation of Orchard's general story. Officers of the postoffice at San Francisco and Denver produced original records showing that in August, 1904, a registered letter was sent under the name of J. Wolff, from the address of Pettibone's store in Denver to "J. Dempsey" at the Golden West Hotel in San Francisco. Orchard swore that he stayed at the Golden West Hotel under an alias that was either "Dempsey" or "Hogan," that Pettibone used the alias of "Wolff" and "Pat Stone," and that under the name of "Wolff," Pettibone in the month mentioned sent him a registered letter containing \$100 to pay his expenses while he was attempting to kill Bradley.

Made Appeal as Mason.

Detectives of Ogdan established the affair here in June, 1903, of Steve Adams and A. T. Williams. The two were found inside a sealed eastbound car loaded with fruit. When arrested for trespass, each was found to have a brace of revolvers. On being released through the influence of a detective, to whom Adams appeared as a Mason, they went straight to the office of the Western Union, it was testified and sent a telegram to Hayward in Denver.

The state also obtained an order of court directing the Western Union to produce its records showing that Hayward sent money to Adams at Ogdan.
