

GIRL WAS CARBONATED

Clothing of Little Gwendoline Vosper of Barton Ignited From Blazing Sheet.

LABOR MEN MAY NOT ENTER FIELD

Convention Adjourns Without Naming Candidates—Death of Mrs. Elizabeth Blackford.

Hamilton, Dec. 11.—(Special.)—Ray Gwendoline Vosper, the 2-year-old daughter of C. A. Vosper, Hess Corners, Barton Township, who runs a stall in the market hall, was fatally burned this morning. Her mother went into the yard for a few minutes, leaving a sheet thrown over a chair near the stove. In her absence the sheet took fire and when she came back she found that the flames had spread to her little daughter's dress. The unfortunate child was rolling on the floor in agony. Before the fire could be extinguished she was so badly burned that she died this evening.

Mrs. Elizabeth Blackford, widow of the late John Blackford and mother of C. D. and J. J. Blackford, died this evening after an illness lasting since last May. She was 65 years of age. Another son, Rev. W. R. Blackford, Brooklyn, Michigan, and six daughters survive. The funeral will be held Monday, and will be private.

SCORES COLORADO'S GOVERNOR.

Courts Rendered Powerless by His Arbitrary Action.

Washington, Dec. 11.—United States Senator Patterson today introduced a resolution directing the committee on the judiciary to investigate the strike among the metalliferous miners of Colorado. The resolution was preceded by a long preamble giving an outline of the history of the strike and by the declaration of martial law by the governor of the state, and the establishment of a press censorship. The preamble declares that "by reason of the doings and attitude of the Governor of Colorado, the courts of the state have been rendered powerless to relieve the suffering and oppressed miners of Colorado, and that it is the duty of the United States Senate to protect the citizens thereof in all or any of their constitutional rights."
