HEADLIGHT FLASHES.

Boycotting the C. P. R. Soo Line—Wabash Building New Combination Cars.

There is a report that Messrs. MacKenzie & Mann have secured a 50 years' lease of the Northern Pacific Portage branch, but this cannot be verified.

The report that the Canadian Pacific Railway has acquired control of the Great Northern and Central Railway is also current.

According to the C. P. R. officials, the United States lines are boycotting the C. P. R. Soo line. The latter, to protect itself, is organizing independent agencies of its own.

The Wabash Railway is building some combination cars of building to run between St. Louis, Detroit, London and Buffalo. One part of the car will be fitted up after the most modern style for smokers, and the other to carry baggage. The car will be longer than the ordinary baggage car.

St. Thomas Journal: A party of Wabash officials were in the city yesterday, and arrangements were completed for the running of Wabash passenger trains over the Air Line. There will be eight trains from each way, and they will commence running on Monday, May 16.

W. E. Davis, general passenger agent for the C. T. R., Montreal, left for Chicago, where he will attend the meeting of the joint passenger committee called for Friday, D. McNicholl, general traffic manager of the C. T. R., and chairman of the sub-committee of the arbitration committee will attend the same meeting, at which his report will come up for consideration.

Railway construction promises to be fairly active in Manitoba this summer, before the snow flies. There is the extension from Belmont and the Dauphin to Foxton and the Deloraine branch into the Pipestone region. The latter two works will be decided on the latter.

The Ogdensburg and Lake Champlain Railway was sold under mortgage foreclosure by W. H. Constock of Utica, master, in Ogdensburg, N. Y., on Monday. Batt, president of the National Security Bank of Boston, and William Lamont, a judge, as a committee representing the income of the bondholders. A protest to the sale was filed by W. A. Shepard, of Boston, who asked a postponement for 30 days owing to the present depression.

FAIR AND COOL—FROST AT NIGHT

Toronto, Ont., May 2-11 p.m.—The shallow depression which was over the lakes last night is now centered in the Upper St. Lawrence Valley. The high pressure over the western portion of the continent has continued to increase in energy, and it has now become very important. Showers have occurred in the lake region and the Ottawa and St. Lawrence valleys. Elsewhere the weather has been generally fair. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Esquimaux, 44-76; Winnipeg, 30-56; Port Arthur, 34-62; Parry Sound, 50-66; Toronto, 48-66; Ottawa, 44-68; Montreal, 44-64; Quebec, 40-64; Halifax, 40-66.

Probabilities—Toronto, May 4-1 a.m.—Fresh northwest and north winds; fair and cool; frost at night at many places.

Local Temperatures—The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory yesterday were 57 and 46 above.
