AT ESQUIMALT.

Steps Taken to Make the Place a Strong Strategic Point.

Victoria, B. C., Nov. 15.—Having made Victoria and Esquimalt Harbours impregnable, the British War Office is now taking another step in making Esquimalt one of the strongest strategic points in the empire. In a letter from Admiral Stephenson just received, it was stated that the ships in the North Pacific squadron are to be soon replaced by modern warships, among them being at least one of the first-class, like the Powerful or Terrible.

"Not only that, but it is intended to fortify every pre-eminence point along the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway. The North Atlantic fleet is also to be greatly strengthened, and the object of fortifying the railway is to render co-operation between the two seaboard practically certain in case of war.

When the changes are complete, 5,000 men will be in service at this station.

A dispatch from Vancouver, B. C., says that the Cinnabar Mining Company, of Savona, near Kamloops, is working large bodies of quicksilver in what is stated to be the only mine of quicksilver operated in the British Empire. There seems to be no limit to Canada's mining resources.

Japan is certainly rapidly becoming civilized. Recently a series of strikes took place in Japanese factories. The workers had long hours and short pay. They struck for improvement in both respects. And in each case their demands were acceded to.

If it is found possible to restore the old channel of the Amu-Daria and divert its waters again into the Caspian Sea, Russia would have the enormous advantage of a continuous waterway from St. Petersburg and the Baltic right away to Afghanistan. Russia is making marked progress these days.

American petroleum only a few years ago constituted the entire supply in the markets of India, China and Japan. It has been to a very considerable extent replaced in those countries by Russian oil, and the trade is now being further divided by the active competition of new fields. Langkat oil, now holds almost a great share of the Chinese trade as the Russian product, and the other newly-opened fields of Borneo, Sumatra and Java are making rapid progress. Although the Japanese oil wells have not done as well as was expected, they furnish a considerable part of the home supply.

A Close Call.

A Lady Struck and Badly Injured by a Trolley Car.

Her Jaw Broken and Several Teeth Knocked Out—A Narrow Escape from Death.

About 8 o'clock on Saturday evening, Mrs. Arthur Piper, of 900 Queen's avenue, was struck by trolley No. 52, and had a very close call for her life.

Mrs. Piper had been shopping, and was crossing over the road at English and Dundas streets, when she perceived a trolley approaching from the west, and made a move to retreat and await its passing. She did not see the car rapidly coming from the east. It struck her, throwing her distance of ten feet. She was picked up unconscious and carried into Dr. Jarvis's office, where Drs. Jarvis and McDonald attended to her injuries.

Mrs. Piper had her body badly bruised, several teeth knocked out, her jaw broken, and a cut above the left eye. She was soon restored to consciousness and conveyed in a hack to her home, where Dr. Gardner, together with Drs. Jarvis and McDonald, made a more thorough examination, and was discovered that in addition to the injuries mentioned, Mrs. Piper was suffering from concussion of the brain. She was very seriously injured, but is now progressing as favorably as can be expected.

The trolley car was in charge of Motorman McIntosh.

India's Peril

Her People Anxiously Awaiting the Delayed Winter Rains.

The Emperor William Putting His Warships in Trim.

Treaty of Peace Between Italy and Abyssinia Signed.

Spaniards Repulsed Instead of Being Victorious in the Philippine Islands.

THIRTEEN DROWNED.

Vienna, Nov. 15.—Great devastation has been caused by floods in Bosnia. A rescue party of 15 persons has been drowned near Serejevo.

DERIVISHES ON THE WARPATH.

Suakim, Nov. 15.—Derivishes have razed the country in the vicinity of Tokar, killing five men and looking a number of cattle. Troops have been dispatched in pursuit of the raiders.

ANOTHER STORY.

London, Nov. 15.—A dispatch from Hong-Kong states that the report from Manila that the Spaniards had won a brilliant victory over the insurgents at Novaleta, the latter losing 400 killed, was incorrect. The truth is that the Spaniards attacked the rebel positions at Novaleta on Nov. 8, but could not carry them, the rebels cleared that they would be executed.

TRANSPORTING TROOPS.

London, Nov. 15.—The steamer Alaska, belonging to the Guano Line, and with a Spanish crew, has left the Clyde for a Spanish port, where she will embark troops for Cuba. She is under charter to the Spanish Government.

The Allan Line steamer Carthagen, from Liverpool, called at Queenstown yesterday, and the detachment of the Leicestershire regiment, which have been ordered to proceed to Halifax.

THE SULTAN WARNED.

Constantinople, Nov. 15.—Signor Pansa, the Italian ambassador, had an audience with the Sultan. He strongly insisted upon the execution of the proposed reforms, and the Sultan declared that he would not carry them out. But, Signor Pansa pointed out that this was not the case, adding that the Sultan was not sufficient to publish reforms. It was necessary to carry them out. The Italian ambassador also strongly insisted upon the punishment, by no means court martial, of Col. Mazuchan Bey, who is held to be responsible for the murder of Father Salvator.

PEACE ASSURED.

Rome, Nov. 15.—It is officially stated here that King Humbert has received a telegram from Menelik, Emperor of Abyssinia, stating that a treaty of peace between Abyssinia and Italy was signed on Oct. 26. The new convention abrogates the Ticiatti treaty, governs the terms of which Italy proclaimed a protectorate over Abyssinia, and recognizes the complete independence of Ethiopia. Menelik declares free all the Italians taken prisoners by the Abyssinians in the present campaign, but Italy will have to indemnify him for their support while in captivity. Maj. Norazzi, the special envoy sent to Menelik by Gen. Baldissera, governor of Erythraea, and commander-in-chief of the Italian forces in that colony, signed the treaty on behalf of Italy.

SPAIN AND UNCLE SAM.

Madrid, Nov. 14.—The United States Minister, Mr. Hannis Taylor, has issued a note declaring that the Spanish Minister for Foreign Affairs, the Duke of Tetuan, has always acted in a manner calculated to prevent a disagreement between the United States and Spain.

A dispatch from Paris details a patriotic outbreak in Spain, which is manifesting itself in an eager desire to subscribe to the new internal loan issued by the Government. Ladies are selling their jewelry in order to raise money to help the Government, while the bishops are promising to devote the gold and silver plate belonging to the churches to the same object. Brokers in Madrid have undertaken to dispose of securities to the amount of 4,000,000. So great is the popular desire to take part of the debt that the Bank of Spain and the Bank of Barcelona were opened yesterday in order to receive subscriptions.

THE GERMAN NAVY.

Berlin, Nov. 15.—Emperor William's orders to arm all the modern vessels of the German navy with 15, 21 and 24 centimeters Krupp quick-firing guns, has given immense satisfaction to naval men. These guns are said by experts to place the German ships ahead in fighting power of those of any foreign navy. In fact, they are declared to be six times more powerful than other vessels of the same size. Orders amounting to many millions of marks have already been placed with Herr Krupp, who hopes soon to be able to apply his latest inventions to the 25-centimeter guns. For the army artillery a similar new equipment will be made, and the cavalry will get a new Mauser self-loading revolver, which is said to be an ideal weapon at close quarters, while it also carried up to 1,500 meters. The breach can be lengthened mechanically and adjusted to the shoulder for aiming.

Another bill which will be presented to the Reichstag provided for an increase in the pay of army officers, from first lieutenant upwards by 50 to 100 per cent; colonels, if this measure becomes law, will receive 6,000 marks; majors will get 6,000; captains will draw 3,000, and lieutenants will be paid 1,800 marks per year.

NO RAIN!

London, Nov. 15.—The Earl of Elgin, Viceroy and Governor-General of India, telegraphs to the Home Government that no rain has fallen in the famine stricken districts during the

week just ending. The crop in the Punjab, the Viceroy says, depends upon the winter rains. The prospects in the Province of Behar are serious. Grain riots have broken out in Sholapur.

The Secretary of State for India has received from the Viceroy the following telegram on the subject of the scarcity:

"Punjab.—Distress anticipated in most of the Satej portion and in transit from Lahore, Gujranwalla, Gujrat, and Shahpur.

"Northwest Provinces.—Autumn crops rather better and affected area smaller than expected. Affected area is quadrilateral, between Muttra, Pilibhit, Gorakhpur, and border to south of Allahabad, with parts of Bijnor, Budaun, and Moradabad, including, say, half population of province. People now eating autumn millets. Distress will begin by middle of December. Revenue-paying rice crops largely failed, and about one-third autumn demand, or one crore, will be suspended. Eighteen lakhs advanced for seed and temporary wells with excellent effect.

"Central Provinces.—Fear of distress in Saugor, Jabalpur, Narsingpur, Hoshangabad, four plateau districts, and part of Raipur.

"General prospects gloomy in Bengal. If no November rain, distress will become serious in part of Patna division and part of Bhagalpur.

Premier Hohenlohe's Statement to the Reichstag.

Germany's Relations With Russia Have Never Ceased to be Friendly.

Berlin, Nov. 15.—In anticipation of a statement from the Imperial Chancellor, Prince Hohenlohe, on the subject of the revelations made by Prince Bismarck through his organ, Hamburger Nachrichten, regarding the secret treaty which existed between Russia and Germany from 1880 to 1890, there was a large attendance at the opening of the Reichstag today.

Among those present was Count Herbert Bismarck, eldest son of the ex-Chancellor, who, it was rumored, was to take an active part in the debate and defend his father against attacks.

Count Von Humprecht, a Centerist leader, introduced the interpellation, notice of which was given on Wednesday last. In brief, the question was, "Did a secret convention between Russia and Germany exist, and if so, what was its nature?" Finally, have the recent disclosures had influence upon the Dreubund and Germany's relations with the other powers?"

In reply, Prince Hohenlohe said: "In regard to the negotiations between Russia and Germany from 1880 to 1890, it was agreed at the time that absolute secrecy should be observed. The point of time when this obligation ceased, cannot, in consequence, be defined by us alone. I, therefore, for the moment, am not in a position to give official information concerning the result of those negotiations."

"So far as regards the tendency of German policy towards Russia since the spring of 1890, it is equally impossible to give an exhaustive reply so long as that obligation continues, and I leave it to the Foreign Secretary."

"After a careful examination of the available material, I cannot help recognizing as full of weight the motives which governed
