London, April 12.—After a long debate upon the alleged lawlessness of the WANTED IMMEDIATELY—MAN WITH ritualistic practices of the English Church Union, the House of Commons last evening unanimously adopted a WANTED-COATMAKER - NONE BUT resolution proposed by Mr. Samuel Screaton & Co. wich, and accepted by Mr. Arthur J. Balfour, first lord of the treasury and government leader, declaring that the house "deplores the spirit of lawlessness shown by certain members of the Church of England, and confidently hopes that the ministers of the crown will not recommend any clergymen for preferment unless satisfied that he will obey the bishops and the prayerbook."

SUNDAY NEWSPAPERS CON-DEMNED. At the meeting held yesterday at Exeter Hall in celebration of the Church Missionary Society's centenary, the Right Rev. George Rodney Eden, B.D., Bishop of Wakefield, created a sensation by attacking the Sunday newspapers, issued for the first time here on Sunday last, and also making an attack upon Pinero's play, "The Gay Lord Quox," saying: "Christian work has never been more necessary than in the week which has witnessed the desecration of the Lord's Day by the publication of a leading daily with a review of the most immoral play which

has ever disgraced the stage of this country." DISASTROUS WRECK.

The British steamer Kingswell (Capt. THE FASTEST AFLOAT. London, April 12.-The Albatross, a new type of torpedo boat destroyer, just built at the yards of Messrs. Thornycroft & Co., at Chiswick, has attained a speed of 33 knots, making this record on her trial trip, with the admiralty officials on board. This is the highest speed reached by any war vessel. The destroyer is 227 feet long and 21 feet in the beam, with a draught of 8½ feet.

MacArthur's Line of Communication Attacked.

Enemy Driven Back, Suffering Heavy Loss.

Two More Villages Captured-Big Engagements Probably Over, but; the War by No Means Ended.

New York, April 12.-A dispatch to the Herald from Manila says: "Lawton's command captured the village of Pagsajan and Lumban yesterday, with some resistance at the latter place. The mouth of the river, commanded by Lumban, was effectively blocked against the entrance of the gunboats. Shells from the Laguna De Bay drove most of the insurgents and British tars repeatedly beating in flight up the mountain side. Troops were concentrated along the railroad as thickly as possible, and the rebels were driven back to the foothills. The roadbed of the railroad was damaged, but it was repaired almost immediately and the traffic was soon resumed through to Malolos.

Wheaton were natives who entered that region in the guise of friendlies. They had seemingly secreted arms in several places, and fired on the Americans from the bushes at so close a range that they could be heard talking. 
