The London papers this morning express their satisfaction, notably at the view of the Egyptian regent, which is held to nullify entirely the French idea that Engand lacks the approval of the Egyptian Government.

Under the circumstances the discussion has been fruitful of misapprehension. I informed him it was in no way my duty to discuss the French claims now, that in abstaining therefrom I must not be understood as in any degree admitting their validity."

EGYPT'S ATTITUDE.

The blue book also contains interesting letters from Moustapha Fohoy, the Regent of Egypt, to Gen. Kitch-ener and Lord Cromer, the British diplomatic agent, respectively, showing Egypt's attitude. He wrote to Gen. Kitchener, warmly thanking him for taking possession of Fashoda, and thereby reconquering for Egypt the provinces which assure her existence, and from which she only retired provisionally.

FRENCH ENCROACHMENT. The regent, in writing to Lord Cromprotested against "the French violation of Egyptian territory," adding that Egypt had never lost sight of the reoccupation of the provinces of he Soudan, which are the actual ources of the vitality of Egypt, and from which she only withdrew owing to force meama jour. He also said that the reconquest of Khartoum would fail to have its effect if the valley of the Nile was not restored to Egypt.

Moustapha Fohoy concluded with referring to the Anglo-French discussion on the subject of Fasnoda, urging Lord Cromer to use his good offices with the Marquis of Salisbury, "in order that the incontestible rights of Egypt may be recognized, and that all the provinces occupied up to the rebellion of Mohamed Ahmed be re-

#### that 100,000 are homeless. IMMENSE UNDERTAKING

Mr. Cecil Rhodes, in an interview, stated that the victory of the sirdar at Omdurman settles the question of an all-British route through Africa. This, as everyone knows, has been Mr. Rhodes' most cherished scheme, and he is much gratified in seeing it in the way of accomplishment. Mr. Rhodes has all the money required for the Tanganyika Railway, which will now be built as expeditiously as possible.

The Tanganyika Railway is to run from Buluwayo to Lake Tanganyika, and will penetrate country that up to the present has been visited only by a few intrepid explorers. Leaving Buluwayo, the line will proceed almost due north, crossing the Zambesi some hundred miles below the celebrated Victoria Falls, which will be thus opened up as a show place to tourists. Thence it passes through the Barotse country, recently ceded to the British South Africa Company by its king, Luanika. The railway will then take a northeasterly direction, running along the western side of the territory officially termed British Central Africa till it reaches Tanganyika. The country through which a considerable portion of the line will pass is said to possess coal and minerals and an abundant labor supply. The length of the line will be about 1,000 miles.
