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NEW FASHODA
LITERATURE

Another British Blue Book Coming Out.

Position Taken by Premier Salisbury Plainly Stated.

Strong Probability That the French Will Relinquish the Disputed Territory.

London, Oct. 23. — The French ambassador to Great Britain, Baron de Courcel, is said to be the bearer of a proposition to the Marquis of Salisbury, which may satisfy both governments. The British Government will issue another blue book, the most important feature of which will be a dispatch, dated Oct. 12, from the Marquis of Salisbury, to the British ambassador at Paris, Sir Edmund Monson, reporting the previous interview with Baron de Courcel, in which Salisbury says: "I generally insisted that the Nile Valley had belonged, and still belonged to Egypt, and that whatever diminution of title had suffered by the mahdi's conquest had been removed by the victory at Omdurman." He then pointed out the helplessness of Major Marchand's position, which Baron de Courcel denied.

Finally, the British premier, in response to Baron de Courcel's suggestion, offered to supply Major Marchand with food and ammunition in order that he might be able to reach French territory. Baron de Courcel then said France wanted an outlet to the Nile, and the Marquis of Salisbury requested that the whole proposition be made in writing. This was

THE LAST INTERVIEW between the ambassador and the premier on this subject. Baron de Courcel then went to Paris, and it is thought that the proposition which he brings embodies the points indicated in this conversation.

THE FRENCH CLAIM. The Salisbury dispatch, in conclusion, said: "The extreme indifference of Baron de Courcel's proposition made it impossible for me to express or form an opinion relative to the territory claimed by France in the Bahr-el-Ghazal region. Under the circumstances the discussion has been fruitful of misapprehension. I informed him it was in no way my duty to take the French claims now, but that maintaining them I must not be understood as in any degree admitting their validity."

EGYPT'S ATTITUDE. The blue book also contains interesting letters from Moustapha Fohy, the Regent of Egypt, to Gen. Kitchener and Lord Cromer, the British diplomatic agent, respectively, showing Egypt's attitude. He wrote to Gen. Kitchener, warmly thanking him for taking possession of Fashoda, and for the measures taken for Egypt's provinces which assure her existence, and from which she only retired provisionally.

FRENCH ENCROACHMENT. The regent, in writing to Lord Cromer, protested against "the French violation of Egyptian territory," adding that Egypt had never lost sight of the reoccupation of the provinces of the Sudan, which are the actual sources of the vitality of Egypt, and from which she only withdrew owing to force majeure. He also said that the reconquest of Khartoum would fall to have its effect if the valley of the Nile was not restored to Egypt.

Moustapha Fohy concluded with referring to the Anglo-French discussion on the subject of Fashoda, urging Lord Cromer to use his good offices with the Marquis of Salisbury, "in order that the incontestable rights of Egypt may be recognized, and that all the provinces occupied up to the rebellion of Mohamed Ahmad be restored to her."

The British cabinet council has been fixed for Thursday next.

"A STUPID MISTAKE." The Paris, Sept. 18, urging peace, remarks: "France would hardly come off better in a war with England than did Spain in the war with the United States. France will be better employed in developing her colonies than in thwarting England."

The Autistic declares that France ought never to have gone to Fashoda, adding: "It was a stupid mistake, and now England calls upon us to get out."

WILL EVACUATE.

The Paris correspondent of the Daily Chronicle claims to have authority to say that a decision has already been taken by the French Government to evacuate Fashoda, and then M. Delcasse, the French foreign minister, will do his utmost to facilitate a pacific solution.

ADMIRALTY ORDERS. The British admiralty issued a number of significant orders yesterday. The dockyards at Portsmouth, Devonport and Chatham have each received instructions to prepare six 30-knot torpedo boat destroyers for commissioning, so that they will be able to put to sea in 24 hours. Overtime has been ordered begun on the first-class cruisers Europa and Nunsundman, so as to have them ready for sea service. Several gunboats in the different dockyards have been ordered to postpone unnecessary refitting.

PRESS COMMENTS. The newspapers discuss the report of the French ambassador, Baron de Courcel, on the subject of the conversation he had with the Marquis of Salisbury, regarding the proposed French outlet on the Nile, as being the leading feature of the yellow book on the Fashoda question. The Conservative organs echo the idea of the Marquis of Salisbury entertaining the surrender of the Bahr-el-Ghazal valley to the French, and the Pall Mall Gazette and the Globe suggests that the ambassador misunderstood the premier, and call upon the latter to make some explanation. The Liberal and Radical papers are not displeased at the prospect of a compromise being arrived at. They believe that provided Major Marchand is recalled the dispute is susceptible to an arrangement by which France will retain some satisfaction in the Bahr-el-Ghazal.

MUST CONTROL THE NILE. London, Oct. 25.—All interest today is centered in the Marquis of Salisbury's addition to the Fashoda correspondence, contained in the publication of the British blue book on that subject. The Conservative newspapers exult in themselves as being highly pleased with his rejoinder to the French yellow book on the same subject. They declare that it dispels the idea spread by the dispatch of the French ambassador, Baron de Courcel, that the British premier was willing to negotiate on the whole question. But the Liberal and Radical organs still consider that the Marquis of Salisbury's attitude admits of negotiations promising a friendly arrangement. The entire press, however, scents the idea of the possession of Fashoda coming within the sphere of the discussion.

The "St. James" Gazette this afternoon says: "We are prepared to negotiate the question of the western frontier of the Bahr-el-Ghazal district. But we must control the Nile, both banks and watersheds, from its source to the mouth."

THE PROMISED MANIFESTO OF Don Carlos is expected shortly.

Count Maella, proprietor of the Rome Gazette di Venezia, has been sent to prison for thirteen months for killing Signor Carvalotti, litterateur and deputy, in a duel.

Prince Henry of Prussia paraded the troops at Tsing Tau fort in honor of the birthday of the Empress of Germany.

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
