

Russ General, Friend of Deposed Czar, Exiles Himself.

London, Oct. 19.—Gen. Gurko, former commander on the Russian southwestern front, has arrived in England with his wife on board a British ship.

The correspondent of the Daily Express, who traveled on the same boat, says that the ship was lying at the entrance to the river outside the port of Archangel awaiting orders to depart for Puncland when late at night a tur stole Aronanger awating others as the stole silently alongside and two unidentified passengers walked up the companion ladder.
