R-34 will meet unsettled conditions, with variable winds, until she is some distance out into the Atlantic. Then it is expected she will have following winds, which will assist her.

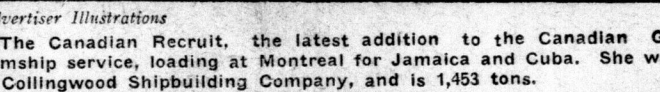
