PIONEER SCOTS TELL ST. ANDREW'S HISTORY AT 50TH BIRTHDAY

700 Guests at Church Anniversary Have Old-Time Supper and Songs.

St. Andrew's Church, on the occasion of the 50th anniversary was made the meeting place of some of the oldest Scotch people in the district last evening, when an old-time supper was served in the basement of the church to almost seven hundred people, the tables requiring a second setting. Day with Christmas, decorated pumpkins and myriads of little candles, the tables looked very attractive, and all things on the menu also proved attractive to the Scottish guests.

In between courses, the younger members of the congregation made things lively, singing all the old-time favorite songs, as well as many of the more recent ones.

Following the supper a program was given in St. Andrew's Hall. T. H. Purdom was chairman. He kept the congregation in ripples of laughter with amusing comments passed upon each speaker. Mr. Purdom referred to the history of the grand old church, which, he said, always seemed to him to be like a great family, always united in happiness. He has never seen the church as when Dufferin avenue was known as Duke street, which proved interesting to the congregation.

Mayor Tells of Pastors. Mayor C. H. Somerville, one of the oldest members of St. Andrew's Church, gave the history of the pastors of the church, naming the Rev. John Scott, followed by Dr. James McAllister Murray, then Dr. Johnson, now Mr. Monreal, who was succeeded by Rev. Dr. Ross, and the present minister, Rev. D. C. MacDermid.

Alex. Gillean related the history of the elders of the church, and Mrs. J. W. Larson gave the history of the Women's Missionary Society. All these old-time reminiscences were full of humor, and Mr. Silverwood lately spoke on the mortgage on the church. An interesting part of the program was the reading of a letter from Alex. B. Taylor, written to T. H. Purdom, who read it to the audience. Mr. Taylor had received an invitation to the jubilee celebration, and expressed his regret at not being able to be present but he referred to the old days of St. Andrew's Church when Mr. Purdom and he were boys in the church school.

Painting by Rev. John Scott. Another pleasant feature of the evening was the presentation to the church of a beautiful painting of Rev. John Scott, the first minister of the church. Mr. Alex. Gillean gave a very valuable picture of the old St. Andrew's Church and its minister.

To give the gathering an old-time air, Mrs. Sage, Mrs. Stevens, John McMillan and Robert Morrison, who are all members of many years' standing in the church, sang in excellent harmony. "Where the Lilies Bloom." The quartet received so great an ovation they made a second appearance and four little girls, frocked in white, presented each with an old-fashioned posy of marigolds.

Robert Morrison then traced the history of the choir and the church of St. Andrew's, which has been led through fifty years by two organists. Of this time Mr. Charles Whiting has been organist and choir leader for 29 years. After a most enjoyable evening "Auld Lang Syne" brought the interesting program to a close.

LONDON FIRM OPENS RIDGETOWN BRANCH

RIDGETOWN, Oct. 22.—The Green-Swift Company of London are preparing to open a branch factory at Ridgetown. The women of the town and district will meet in the municipal hall Monday night to complete plans for a banquet for the returned soldiers of Ridgetown and vicinity. L. W. Rogers, national lecturer of the Theosophical Society, who will give a series of lectures on "Theosophy and the New Psychology" in the Theosophical Hall, 212 Dundas street, October 29, 30, 31 and November 1.

Mr. Rogers was an expert and psychologist, who has been on the lecture platform for 27 years. The last fourteen of which have been given in Australia. His itinerary includes Europe and Australia as well as the United States and Canada.

He is the author of several books on occult subjects and his book "Dreams and Premonitions" he attacks the materialistic hypothesis of dreams as being utterly insane to explain the facts and phenomena supported by unquestionable evidence.

Mr. Rogers spent several months in Australia in the service of the Government, making way speeches to encourage recruiting that country being the only one of the Allied nations that rejected conscription, and relied wholly upon volunteers.

In his first address on Wednesday, entitled "The Soldier's Soul," Mr. Rogers will deal with the first experiences after death of the soldiers who lose their physical bodies in the battlefield, from the viewpoint of psychical research.

CHURCH ARMY WILL HELP FILL CANADA WITH IMMIGRANTS

And These Will Be of the Best Kind.

The Church Army's efforts to assist immigration to Canada were discussed at the Rotary Club yesterday by Rev. Canon Pugh of London, England. His address dealt with the representation of the Church Army in Canada, which has been little advertised, he said, but the boys from the front could tell what work it has done. It had \$1,000,000 entrusted to its management, but was established, and he believed that it was the first to go into the front line. At the end of the war it had not been necessary to appeal to the public for money to pay its debts.

With the war over, the Church Army realized that there would be a sweeping tide of emigration, and the liking for outdoor life which the men had acquired on war service, and the fact that they were the best of the Dominion had been a walking advertisement for his country.

Up to Canada. The Imperial government has offered free transportation to ex-service men and their wives, but not to munition makers, as has been frequently stated here. The speaker said, immigrants must be approved by the Canadian authorities so that these would be to the benefit of the Dominion. They were allowed to enter the country. The Church Army plans to spend \$1,000,000 in training, testing, transporting and tending immigrants. It believes in the principle of testing a man before he left the shores of England, believing that the English failure is a colonial wreck. He asked Canadians to give these people the hand to welcome and to build them into the great nation now in process of formation.

For Victory Loan. A. L. Anderson addressed the club in behalf of the Victory Loan. There is doubt as to the success of this venture, particularly as far as the larger investors are concerned. He said that the C. P. R. has agreed to take \$17,000,000, the Canada Life Insurance Company \$10,000,000 and the Dominion Insurance companies \$2,000,000. He pointed out that these financial institutions were not motivated by motives of patriotism, but because they realized that it would be probably the last time Canadian fifteen-year bonds would be offered at 5 per cent. Bond buying in the United States was more largely a matter of patriotism, because there the rate of interest was only 4 per cent.

Only Income Taxable. If the loan was not a success, he said, Canada would not be able to obtain its fair share of export trade or to look after the returned soldier properly.

He traced the history of the idea that this loan is taxed as to principal. Only the income from it is liable to taxation, but as the case of city of London bonds or any other bonds on the market, with the exception of previous Canadian Victory loans.

Leat.-Col. W. M. Garsshore reported for the committee co-operating with the hospital in conjunction with Victoria Hospital. The committee will continue to act in an advisory capacity.

SENDS TWO BOYS FOR TRIAL ON HOLD-UP CHARGE AND THEFT

Ralph Gibson, Lawrence Flanagan, May Face More Charges Here.

Ralph Gibson and Lawrence Flanagan, who have been implicated in a number of offences at Windsor, and Tilbury, since they left Detroit in the London district, where they claim their homes are, will be arraigned before a judge for trial on Monday, November 3, on two charges. The young men, who are 22 and 18 years of age respectively, pleaded guilty to the first charge, when they appeared before Judge Talbot Macbeth yesterday morning, that of unlawfully assisting Harry Harvey, a merchant of Woodgreen, near Gloucester, with intent to steal, and while armed with offensive weapons, on Tuesday, October 21. They were arrested last Friday on Dundas street by Detective Harry Down for that offence, and subsequently conducted before Squire W. H. Chittick on Saturday morning, when they were committed for trial.

Then, yesterday afternoon, they were arraigned again before Squire Chittick charged with unlawfully entering the garage belonging to Dexter Dancy, of Tilbury, and stealing from it automobile accessories valued at \$200. They were once more committed for trial.

Following the arrest by Detective Down, the accused were fined \$10 and costs in the police court last Saturday for carrying revolvers, but they could not pay the fine, and were confined to the county jail, and held there on the more serious charges. Two more charges may follow, making a total of four, because the boys are alleged to have entered the Merchants' Bank, Tilbury, where they stole a revolver belonging to M. E. C. C., and which was found in their possession when arrested in this city. They are also alleged to have stolen a motor car during their visit to Windsor.

The first witness to give evidence yesterday afternoon was Dexter Dancy, the owner of the Tilbury garage which the accused entered on the night of Oct. 21, between the hours of 11:30 and 7:30. He stated that he had left his property securely locked, and upon returning to work the next morning had found the door open, but the door lock and all of the window shutters intact. A few moments later Dancy claims to have discovered the loss of several motor tubes, spark plugs and outer casings, valued at \$200.

Detective Harry Down, the next witness, described the events leading up to and following the arrest of the two young men. He stated that they had a five-passenger Flannigan Ford car to him on Dundas street last Friday. Upon lifting the rear seat he saw the stolen goods and the license number of a missing automobile, which immediately aroused his suspicions and prompted the arrest. After about ten minutes in the police station the younger boy of the two, Flannigan, told most of the details of his story to the detective, who related the story in the magistrate's court yesterday.

LAW ASSOCIATION OF MIDDLESEX REGRETS DEATH OF G. GIBBONS

Mr. Gibbons was the eldest and only surviving son of the late Sir George and Lady Gibbons. He was born in London, and it was his home all his life. His education was completed at the Royal Military College, Kingston. He studied in his father's office, and on his call to the bar at Osgoode Hall became a member of the firm of Gibbons, Harper & Gibbons.

He was endowed with good ability and had won a good place at the bar. He had contested London for its representation in the House of Commons and fought a good fight.

Sir George Gibbons died a little over a year ago. He had been president of the London and Western Trusts Company, and on his death his son was elected president. A larger share of the responsibility in conducting the very important practice enjoyed by the firm fell to the son on his father's death, and it is believed his devotion to those increased duties hastened his death.

It is more than usually sad when the fathers of so bright a son, whose brightness and prosperity that he did not live to enjoy it, that death came at the early age of thirty years.

The members of the Middlesex Law Association extend to his widow and family their heartfelt sympathy in their irreparable loss. The members attended the funeral yesterday.
