It is stated that with his election to the leadership at the national Liberal convention, held at Ottawa in October last, Mr. King himself off from all source of income until he has taken his place in the House of Commons on Thursday next.

Reduction in Tariffs Would Have Meant \$17,000,000 of a Loss.

OTTAWA, Feb. 19.—References made to the tariff by Hon. Arthur Meighen in his Winnipeg speech are interpreted in political circles as implying that any tariff changes made in the next budget will be of a minor character. This has been expected. When the tariff changes were made last year, the hope was expressed that within a year industrial conditions would have become so stabilized as to permit of a general revision. There was also indication of a tariff inquiry by the minister of finance, and at least two of his colleagues. But owing to prevailing conditions, the tariff inquiry has been postponed, and there is, so far, no definite indication when it will open.

SCHOOL BOOKS WILL NOT RISE IN PRICE; GOVT. PAYS THE SHOT

TORONTO, Feb. 19.—In order that school children may continue to obtain their school books at the same old prices, instead of at higher prices they would have to pay if charged in proportion to the new contract prices paid by the Government, the Ontario Government will continue the policy adopted by the late Hebert Government, and pay the difference to the publishers.

U. S. SENATOR FLAYS HENRY FORD, CALLS AUTOMOBILE A PEST

Senator Sherman Declares Motor Car Manufacturer Enlisted Government Aid.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 19.—Henry Ford and all his works were attacked in the Senate today by Senator Sherman, Republican, Illinois. Setting himself up as "one of those who knew everything instantly and who knew everything instantly," Mr. Ford had reared a financial monster, said Senator Sherman. He had secured congressional aid in acquiring and improving the land for private purposes, and had enlisted the services of the Federal Government in promoting his political interests in Michigan, while his son, Edsel, was making good his escape from the military draft.
