**MISS BLANCHE MILLS** TELLS OF THRILLING **ESCAPE FROM TURKS**

> The many friends of Miss Blanche Mills, niece of Mr. and Mrs. T. N. Way, Elmwood avenue, will be glad to welcome her home to the city at the end of this month, after she has spent over a year in reconstruction work in Armenia. Miss Mills, who sailed from New York a year ago last February with a party of two hundred and fifty doctors, nurses and teachers sent out by the United States Government, had signed up for but a year's service in Armenia. So pressing was the need there, however, at the end of the year, that she decided to remain longer, only leaving the country when the whole commission was compelled to evacuate, the 1st of May, on account of the invasion of the

> Turks and Bolsheviks. Her description of their flight from Armenia is graphic and interesting. It appears in a letter dated May 15 and written on board the steamship Huntsville in the Aegean Sea. The Escape.

"We are on our way to Egypt. Things "We are on our way to Egypt. Things have happened within the past two weeks with such kaleidoscopic swiftness that I cannot realize it. On the 1st of May an Armenian office brought us the order from our high commissioner, Col. Haskell, to evacuate at once and to leave everything behind. At first we begged to stay, but being in the army, we could only obey. So we packed our souvenirs and left them with a responsible Armenian officer to send on later, if possible. But I fear it is good-bye, souvenirs!

"The officer told us that the Bolsheviks and Turks would soon be in the town, and we could do nothing; our flour had given out and the people were clamoring for bread, and having bread riots already; the trains would run only a week longer and then our supplies would be cut off.

"We closed up our work and turned over \$1,000,000 worth of property and supplies to a responsible Armenian. (My heart aches for them—the Turks on the south and the Bolsheviks on the north are going to wipe out the Armenians entirely, I fear).
