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AN ELECTION ROORBACK OVER SENTINEL ARTICLE

Cons. Claim Libs. Have Been Playing a Trick on Mayor Stewart—Two Days' Happenings.

HAMILTON, Oct. 25.—(Special).—The labor men wound up the campaign with a meeting Saturday night in a tent at the corner of King and Walnut-streets. The tent was 60 by 40 feet and it was jammed. There were no seats, but the crowd remained for the speeches of Candidates Sam Landers and Allan Studholme, M.L.A., and cheered their hoarse.

Landers says he has a perfect organization for getting out the vote and all his workers are volunteers. Saturday night he scored both his opponents. He said he was told that the reason Premier Whitney refused to speak here in the interests of the Conservatives was because he and his cabinet were displeased with Mr. Landers' vote for the Radial Bill, which was a slap at provincial rights. As to Mr. Eastwood, Mr. Landers repeated his charges that some of the mechanics employed on the drill hall were paid below union scale and that the fair wage officer so reported to the government. The campaign has been very quiet here, but some desperate tactics have been employed and there will be a very strenuous battle Monday. Both the old parties appear to have lots of money. The electors have been furnished with clippings from The Orange Sentinel, Toronto, re the Autonomy Bill. The clippings were enclosed with Mayor Stewart's picture. The Conservative workers have enclosed this literature out and the Liberal charge Conservatives with it.

A Libel Suit.—Cyrus Navin is suing the Dundas Banner for alleged libel. In a report of a burglar the paper said Mr. Navin could not have been connected with the affair because he was in jail at the time. The Banner apologized, laying the blame for the statement on a typographical error.

Under the terms of the contract the city council made last July with the Cataract Power Co. for supplying electric energy to the city it is stipulated that no motor may be run by the city unless the company approves of it. The fire and water committee has ordered two new motors for the water works, but cannot install them until the company approves of the motors.

Private Detective Huckle, who was arrested on a charge of blackmail and extortion, has indicated that he would consult the attorney-general's department, and get out warrants for the arrest of some police officers.

The local police have been asked to look out for Wm. Watcher, Jr., Doncaster, who is accused of bringing voters to the interests of the Liberal candidate.

The congregation of St. George's Church celebrated its 18th anniversary. Rev. Canon Dixon preached.

Mrs. Julia Ann Bell, 116 North Catharine-street, died on Saturday afternoon in her 90th year. She formerly lived in Dundas.

Mrs. Martin, Canon and Ashley-streets, died while on a visit to her daughter at Clarksburg, Ont. The body will be brought here for interment.

Word was received here on Saturday night of the death of John H. Hahn, 64 Wilson-street, who was on his way to California, where he was going for the benefit of his health. He was formerly a milk dealer and well known. The body is expected to arrive here about Wednesday.

Geo. Birrell, 21 Southeast-avenue, the well known hardware manager, died to-day at his home. He had been ill only a few days. He was a prominent member of the Masonic Order and an enthusiastic sportsman. He was 48 years old.

HEART ROMANCES ARE TREATED TOO LIGHTLY

Rev. E. C. Laker Asks Parents to Take Interest in Young Folks' Love Affairs.

Taking for his subject "Social Relationship of Young People," Rev. E. C. Laker, at the Clinton-traced Methodist Church, last evening traced the romance and various interpretations of love.

The Bible, he said, spoke much of love, and love played a large part in human life. The word "courtship," he thought, is of exalted etymology, as it often has the idea of court, while its original idea was loyalty.

"The heart romances of young people's lives are too often treated as trivial, and relegated to the place of humor and laughter," declared the minister, "but it is an ill-timed humor."

"So much of life's weal or woe depends on the choice of life's companion that the pulpit ought occasionally to preach an earnest sermon on this subject," he said, and believed it more serious when a woman makes a mistake than when a man does.

A Divine Institution.—"The heart of the world," said he, "stands at the marriage altar, and marriage is a divine institution. It is the most momentous play between the cradle and the grave. Flippant carelessness of the holy vow of matrimony is to profane a holy institution, which is mockery of the throne of God. Marriage is desirable, but desirability is not a necessity, for sometimes financial, physical or mental reasons, and marriage should be a natural choice."

Mr. Laker deplored the evidence then shown in the church of hypocrisy, counterfeit womanhood and polished rascals. He was out a pessimist, but on the contrary, considered this the golden age of life.

Appeals to Parents.—Concluding, the preacher advised parents to take a deeper interest in the love affairs of young people and made an earnest appeal to all to manifest a tender and honest love and for all to live a religious life.

GRENS SHOW ESTEEM FOR THEIR COMMANDER

Three Beautiful Presentations to Mrs. A. E. Gooderham on Silver Wedding Anniversary.

A pleasant event—or series of events—testifying to the love and esteem in which Lieut.-Col. and Mrs. A. E. Gooderham are held by the Grenadiers, was the presentation to Mrs. Gooderham of a number of beautiful tokens on Saturday evening, the occasion being the celebration of the 25th anniversary of her marriage.

The first intimation that the recipients had of the surprise to come was the sudden striking up outside the residence of Dean Croft's residence, of the stirring strains of the regimental march, "The British Grenadiers," the brass band of the regiment having volunteered to parade full strength under the leadership of the officers of the regiment, with the exception of two out of the city, were in close waiting and invaded the residence, bearing with them a magnificent sterling silver punch bowl. The presentation was entrusted to Lieut.-Col. (Dr.) King and he in a few happy remarks conveyed the gift to Mrs. Gooderham. Major Brock and Major Mason, D.S.O., also added felicitations.

Shortly afterwards, a deputation from the Royal Grenadiers chapter, Daughters of the Empire, brought a beautiful sterling silver-fruit bowl on behalf of the chapter. The deputation were Mrs. E. E. King, Mrs. Bewley, Mrs. Watson and Mrs. Sprinks.

At 10.30 p.m. the sergeants of the regiment in full strength arrived with their testimonial in the form of two very striking sterling silver vases.

The bowl is very handsomely hand-crafted with festoons of maple leaves on either side of the body, branches of maple leaves overhanging, which with leaves form unique side handles. The design of decoration is introduced on the foot and around the inside of the bowl at the top. The 10th Royal Grenadiers' crest is embossed on the front of the bowl, and on the opposite side is this inscription:

"Presented to Lieut.-Col. and Mrs. Albert E. Gooderham, by the officers of the 10th Royal Grenadiers, on the occasion of the twenty-fifth anniversary of their marriage, Toronto, Oct. 25, 1908."

"Four hand grenades form the feet, the flange being gold relief. The bowl is gold lined. The design, which is very unique in character, was largely thought out by Colonel Edmund E. King, and the work, which was executed by the Toronto Silver Plate Co., is a splendid specimen of Canadian silversmithing."

MUST APPEAR FOR TRAIL AS CONSELING MURDER

Serious Charge Preferred Against an Italian District Constable in Parry Sound.

PARRY SOUND, Oct. 25.—Arling out of what has come to be known as the Eno robbery, some time ago, there are some very startling matters just come to light by a confession which has been made by the Italian prisoners, Seperanzo and Pezzano, confined in the jail here, as a result of which Constables McRae and Madigan went to Byng Inlet and there arrested Joseph W. Moore, an Italian, on a warrant charging him with inciting to murder.

The story told by the Italian prisoners is a remarkable one, and it is understood that other charges may be preferred against the accused man, Moore.

In their confession the prisoners in question state that Seperanzo, who was convicted of the recent assassins of shooting at Constables Knight and Madigan and sentenced to twelve years' imprisonment, therefore, had nothing to do with the Eno robbery; but they allege that the persons who actually committed the robbery were boarding at the establishment of the accused man, Moore, before the robbery and after, and they go so far as to say that Moore was the instigator of the whole thing. They allege that when the robbery the stolen money was taken to Moore's store at Byng Inlet, and it is understood that Moore has admitted that there was found behind his store a tin containing \$400, which was the money of the robbery and of away with. As a fact, one of the men originally arrested in connection with the robbery at Eno's was taken by Moore's store.

It is also alleged by this confession that after the men who had been arrested in connection with the robbery had broken jail, the circumstances of which were not given, they went back to Moore's store. This statement is confirmed by one of the constables who saw a suit of clothes hanging in Moore's store, which was let when one of the accused men was arrested, and that subsequently this suit was found at Guelph in the boarding house, where the little Italian, Pezzano, now in jail here, was recaptured.

The confession of Seperanzo went on to state that the Italian, Moore, declared he would get revenge against Murdoch Watts for his action in connection with an affray which took place at Byng Inlet, as Watts had prosecuted certain of his countrymen, Moore stated that Moore had offered him \$150 if he would go and shoot Watts and offered him a gun to do it. In the course of his confession Seperanzo alleged that Moore had also defrauded his creditors by removing goods prior to the making of an assignment. He also stated where some of the goods of the countrymen, Moore stated that he had taken to the place mentioned and found goods which are believed to be some of the goods, the property of the creditors, which were found in a stable on Still River, about four miles from the store.

The most remarkable feature of the case is that Joseph W. Moore, who after the Eno robbery, came to Parry Sound and offered his services as a constable for the purpose of tracking down his countrymen, the perpetrators of the robbery, and, being duly appointed, at once seemed to busy himself in the matter and expressed himself as able to effect the arrests very shortly.

The accused man Moore was brought before the police magistrate charged with counselling a person to murder Murdoch Watts and was committed to stand his trial.
