Mme. Liza Lehmann WINS GREAT PLAUDITS

English Woman Composer Proves Her Right to Title—Soloists Sing Brilliantly.

The heralding that Mme. Liza Lehmann received from the press was fully justified last night at Massey Hall when the great English composer of "In a Persian Garden" was heard for the first time.

The sincere encomiums in applause from the audience, it was not until the soloists in Mme. Lehmann's "Nonsense Songs" did their part that the audience saw that they were listening to one of the cleverest composers, rivaling indeed Richard Strauss in his "Symphonia Domestica."

The Soloist. In this regard Mme. Lehmann was assisted in a cycle of songs devoted to an interpretation of the popular lyrics of Lewis Carroll in "Alice in Wonderland." The three bird songs as they were called on the program, were delightfully done by Miss Barbour, evidently with the conception that Canadians were not used to fine coloratura.

The much-advertised Master Hole, proclaimed as the world's greatest "boy soprano," disclosed a voice of exceptional sweetness and power. But the boy has been spoiled. Our own Wilfred Morrison can sing just as sweetly and does not have the "smoky" mannerisms of Master Hole.

Otherwise Mme. Lehmann's concert was exceedingly pleasurable, and she may go away from Toronto with the feeling that her genuine art had gained the appreciation of a really representative audience of Canadian music-lovers.
