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BRITISH SPORTSMEN PLAYING BIG GAME

London, Jan. 1.—(New York Herald cable).—Casualities among the leading sportsmen of England continue to grow, this week's list containing the names of stars in every branch of sport. Opl. M. B. McTaggart, D.S.O., wounded, played polo for the Lancers in the inter-regimental and was in the team which ran up the for the Subalterns Cup at Ranelagh in 1904. He rode for many years at the regimental meets and owned some useful chasers. He was with Sir George White during the siege of Ladysmith and fought at Elandslaagte, Rietfontein and Lombards Kop.

The famous steeplechase jockey, Percy Woodland, who won the Grand National in 1903 on Drumcree and in 1913 on Covert Coat and who was previously reported "missing, believed killed," is now officially announced to be a prisoner in the hands of the Turks.


Capt. C. H. Dwyer, killed by a sniper while on reconnaissance duty, was educated at Lees, Hoylake and Shrewsbury, where he was captain of the gymnasium for two years, represented the school at Addershot and also got his colors for foot.

FAMOUS WINNIPEG OARSMAN PASSES

Winnipeg, Jan. 1.—Word was received here that W. J. U. Osborne, former Winnipeg athlete, has died at Ladner, B.C. The late Mr. Osborne traveled for a Winnipeg firm twentry years ago.
