MARTHUR AND MACVAY MAKE REPLY TO ENGINEER HUNTER

Sharp Letter from the Contractors Submitted to Water and Sewerage Board Yesterday --- Action on Engineer's Resignation Stands Over for the Present.

At the meeting of the water and sewerage board yesterday a letter was read from Mr. MacArthur and MacVay, in which they made some startling statements about Engineer Hunter. Mr. Hunter's letter of resignation was also read, but action upon it was deferred until Engineer Barbour can be present.

The mayor occupied the chair and Ald. Hannan, Mr. MacArthur, Frink, Holder, Lewis, Sprout, Tilley, Christie, MacRae, Pickett, McDermick, Vanwart, and Baxter were present with Superintendent Murdoch, the director and common clerk. George MacArthur and H. G. Hunter were in attendance. Mr. Hunter's letter of resignation, which had been previously published, was read.

The following communication from contractors MacArthur & MacVay was then read:

To the chairman and members of the water and sewerage board:

Permit us to make a few remarks made necessary by the publication of the letter of resignation of Mr. Hunter, resident engineer of the water and sewerage board. We have tried to do his duty, and feel that he has been successful in carrying out the work entrusted to him. Then he goes on to say that the handling of the water and sewerage works is his hardest work, and that he has resorted to anything and everything to keep us in line. Ald. Sprout asked if Mr. Hunter was engaged until the work was finished. The chairman replied that no time contract had been entered into. Mr. Hunter was still in the service of the city.

Ald. Christie thought it would be ridiculous to accept Mr. Hunter's resignation. At the present time they were not in possession of the documents connected with the work and the city should be in possession of all such papers before any steps were taken.

Anchor Line Warehouse at Reid's Point leased to Wm. Thomson & Son.

The board of directors yesterday agreed to lease the Anchor line warehouse at Reid's Point, to Wm. Thomson & Son, from January next for the use of the South Shore steamer Senlac at a rental of \$200 a year and to build a 40-foot drop at a cost of about \$400. Tenders were ordered to be called for steam heating in the Reid's Point warehouse and the director will prepare plans and specifications. The estimated cost is \$1,200. Ald. Christie occupied the chair, and the mayor, Ald. Pickett, Baxter, MacRae, McDermick, Sprout, Holder, Vanwart, Lewis and Tilley were present with the director and common clerk.

Ald. Baxter asked if tenders were being called for the steam heating of the warehouse at Reid's Point.

The director said he had no instructions.

Ald. Baxter moved that the director prepare plans and specifications for steam heating the offices and also the garage. It was doubtful, he said, if C. P. R. would be able to supply steam for both.

The director said the cost would be about \$1,200.

Ald. McDermick wished Fred Barr associated with the director in preparing the plans, as he was an expert.

The chairman did not think any name should be mentioned.

Ald. Pickett while having no objection to Mr. Barr thought as he was selling a certain system of heating the matter should be left entirely to the director.

The motion was carried.

The director will see the C. P. R. with reference to a supply of steam.

A letter from E. W. Thomson offering \$200 a year for the Anchor line warehouse for the Senlac, conditionally, on the city putting in a drop, was read.

The director reported that a 40-foot drop would cost \$400. He suggested a similar agreement to that with the D. A. R. and a rental of \$200 a week.

Mr. Thomson was heard by the board. He said at a rental of \$200 they would be paying \$100 less than the I. C. R., but there was less accommodation and extra labor would be required. The wharf would be required only 24 hours a week. His firm would be willing to take the warehouse for two or three years on the conditions that if for any reason the Senlac was abandoned the city take it off their hands. He estimated the drop would cost \$400 and they would be willing to pay the cost to the city if the use of the warehouse was discontinued in one year or \$200 if not in use at the end of two years.

Ald. McDermick urged the claims of Messrs. Quinn, Doherty, Hurley and Daley, boatmen, who had asked for a room in the warehouse.

Ald. I. moved that Mr. Thomson's proposal be accepted.

The director mentioned that the city's life boat was in the warehouse. A leap to hold it would cost \$40. Mr. Thomson agreed to contribute \$20 towards the cost as all the room in the warehouse was required for freight.

Ald. McDermick moved an amendment for a shed for the boatmen. He felt bound to protect them, he said, and, recalling an occasion when he had been rescued from a watery grave, added "you don't know what it is to have your life in danger until you get trimmed."

Ald. Lewis did not think the amendment touched the motion. The amendment was lost and the motion carried.
