Board of Directors, N. B. Telephone Co., Decide on Change

START IN SPRING

Increased Demand for Service Results in Adoption Modern Equipment

DECISION to commence the installation of an automatic telephone system in Saint John was reached this morning at the quarterly meeting of the board of directors of the New Brunswick Telephone Company, Ltd., held in their offices in Prince William street. The project will entail the erection of a new building at the rear of their present headquarters, the total cost of the initial development to be in the vicinity of \$250,-This announcement was made by the managing director, H. P. Robinson, after the meet-

ing arose at noon. The building alone will cost in the vicinity of \$70,000. Preliminary plans are now well under way and the expectation is that active construction operations will commence as soon as the weather permits next spring.

BUSINESS PHONES FIRST.

It is estimated that the installation of the first group of automatic telephones will be completed in one and one-half to two years, so that the first operation of the improved equipment will likely start late in 1928 or early in 1929. This space of time is required on account of the intricacy of

the plans for engineering, construction and installation.

The first unit in the new system will consist of about 2,000 lines and telephones, which will take care of the culk of the business houses of the city. The remainder of the instruments wi be changed over to automatics as the central office equipment wears out. In other words, all the replacements made offer the first unit is installed, will be of the improved type. As the resi-dence telephones will remain in manual operation at central, the new plans of the company will not seriously affect the employment of operators, Mr.

INCREASED DEMAND

The decision of the Telephone Company, he added, had been brought about by the increased demand for telephone service in the city, and will put the company in line with modern thought in telephone development. He said that it was anticipated that within five years half the phones in Canada would be operated under the automatic system.


