CONGRESSMAN FACES LAWSUIT BY GIRL OF 18

Complainant's Mother Named
Guardian in \$50,000 Action
Against Oklahoman.

Supreme Court Justice Mullan signed an order yesterday appointing Mrs. Elizabeth Niebel of 185 West Forty-sixth street guardian of her daughter, Anna Elizabeth, to bring suit against Congressman Maud Herrick of Oklahoma, for \$50,000 for breach of promise, says the New York Times.

Justice Mullan said that she was 18 years old and had a good claim against the Congressman.

Mrs. Niebel has previously declared that while she was one of the leaders in a beauty contest conducted by a Washington newspaper, while she lived here and told her he was rich and that if she married him she wouldn't have to work. She was one of forty-eight contestants to whom Congressman Herrick is alleged to have written letters recommending himself as one who had led a blase life and who before eight years would "ascend to the highest office in the land."

His letters concluded, "would you like to meet a gentleman caller?" Congressman Herrick contended later that his only purpose in writing the "questionnaires" was to gather material for a bill he introduced later to put a stop to beauty contests in newspapers on the ground that they brought into the young girls into the limelight and subjected them to temptations. He said he intended to submit the answers to his letters to the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives when it considered his bill.

Mrs. Niebel said that Congressman Herrick told her he had remained single because the only woman he ever loved married another man. She said he told her: "I long for companionship and want to get a wife. I have only an adopted sister and two clerks for close friends. Won't we be happy?"

Congressman Herrick's alleged attentions to Miss Elizabeth Shorey, another contestant, caused her mother to ask the Washington police to keep him away from her daughter.

Congressman Herrick, who hails from Perry, Okla., where he owns a ranch, is a new member of the House. He has sued two newspapers for libel because of articles concerning his "questionnaires."
