Paris, Dec. 19.—Georges Carpentier has grown a mustache, a correspondent of The Auto informs the world after interviewing the noted French pugilist prior to his departure for England to meet Bob, the Australian fighter, on January 2. Record Broken.

Providence, R. I., Dec. 19.—(Canadian Press.)—Brown defeated McGill in the opening meet of the 1921-22 swimming schedule here Saturday night, 99 points to 14. Jones, of Brown, featured the event, setting a new 100 yard record of 55.2 seconds for the Colgate-Hoyt tank. Vermont, McGill premier swimmer, clipped 28.5 seconds off the Brown tank record at 220 yards, when he turned in the remarkable time of two minutes 29.2 seconds in his heat against Smith. Smith holds the New England A. A. U. title in this swim and was the favorite.

RELIQU OF LOST L-20.
London, Dec. 19.—A German water plane has been found in Mar Forest, Decade. "Flares of this type were dropped by Zeppelins to enable the commander to ascertain whether he was flying over land or water."

This particular flare, which was found by a gull and handed by him to the Ministry, was so dented and damaged by the ill-fated Zeppelin L-20, which left Germany with nine other airships on the morning of May 2, 1916. The L-20 crossed the coast of Scotland at Lunan Bay and flew on past Montrose, where it turned inland, and flew past Brechin over the Forest of Mar and within fifteen miles of Balmoral. It crossed the Monadhliath Mountains and the Caledonian Canal. It then altered its course and flew east by north and dropped four bombs in the north of Aberdeenshire, and recrossed the coast near Cruden.

Over the North Sea the L-20 met heavy winds and was driven against high land at Sandness in Norway, on the morning of May 3. The airship was badly damaged and fell into a fjord and sank. Her commander was Captain-Lieutenant Stabert.
