In Saskatchewan itself there are very few unemployed. Mr. Molloy does not think that there are 500 men out of work in the province and of these very few have farm experience. 

"In 1891 A. E. Foote, in cutting the Canyon Diable meteoric iron, found a black vitreous mineral, having a hardness above that of sapphire, and which he announced to be a diamond. Later, O. W. Huntington, by dissolving a considerable quantity of this iron, was able to Isolate a considerable number of minute, colorless particles, which had not merely the hardness of diamonds, but the crystal outlines as well. The crystals found by Huntington were, it should be stated, minute—about a hundredth of an inch in diameter. Since Hunington's work, diamonds have been separated from the Canyon Diablo and other irons by several workers."
