LOAN FOR EAST ST. JOHN SCHOOLS

Fredericton, May 4.—The board of edu-
cation held a meeting this afternoon,
Hon. C. W. Robinson, presiding, as act-
ing premier. His honor the Lieutenant-
Governor was unable to be present. Sev-
eral members also were absent.

The board approved the application of
the school board for East St. John for
powers to borrow \$10,000 to complete a
new school building. Previous borrow-
ings for the purpose had totalled \$40,000.

The special committee appointed to
consider the matter of public kinder-
gartens being added to the school sys-
tem, reported. The report will not be
made public until forwarded to the St.
John authorities with whom the matter
originated.

PROHIBITION IN MINORITY IN AULD SCOTIA

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
London, May 4.—It is officially
stated that the recent prohibition
bill in Scotland cost nearly £20,000.
Five hundred and nine areas voted
in favour, forty for no license, 508,727
people voted for no change and 453,
276 for no license.
