### FEAR HARD TIMES WITH A DEMOCRATIC PRESIDENT

Large Number of Italians Leave States For Home Taking \$200,000 With Them

Boston, Nov. 24.—Fearing hard times as a result of the coming change in the administration, a throng of Italians left yesterday on the White Star liner Oreste, bound for Naples and Genoa. Nearly 1800 steerage passengers were on the liner, the majority of them Italians. Among the passengers there were also about 100 Portuguese and some Greeks.  
The day following election there was a rush to secure passage on the steamer. Out of town agents of the line reported applications from forty to fifty Italians a day for several days. The Italians said they feared they would be thrown out of work now that a democratic president had been elected, but could give no reason for their belief. Most of them withdrew their savings from the banks and it is estimated that the passengers leaving here on the liner took out of the country fully \$200,000. Entire families went back to their old homes to spend the remainder of their days.

NICKEL PROGRAMME A TREAT

With one of Dickens' stories told before the camera, a finely done picture of farm life in Maine, an entertaining booklet of table views of recent events and with two new singers, the Nickel certainly began the week with an attractive programme, clear cut and dainty in every particular. The Dickens story is Mrs. Liripier's Boarders, one he wrote in 1860 for the Christmas number of a magazine called All The Year 'Round. Prominent 'V'itagraph players enact the story, which is one of those deeply human interest tales in recounting which the great writer was master. If there is a tear rolled down the cheek at the climax it is a triple tribute to the author, the actors and to one's own good heart.

## SAVOFF, MOLTKE OF BALKANS

(London Daily News)

General Michael Savoff, whose daring and victorious leadership is just now attracting world-wide attention, has always enjoyed the reputation of being one of Bulgaria's strong men. Almost his existence was hardly suspected; but in his country, people had been long accustomed to see in him the future Commander-in-Chief of the Bulgarian mobilized legions. Even before the distribution of the higher commands had been announced, public opinion had already vested the supreme post on his hands. For one civil and military circles proved of one mind, and never was an appointment greeted with greater unanimity.

To those who know the Bulgarian generalissimo and have followed his past career, all this was in perfect accord with the fitness of things. During a period of some twenty-five years General Savoff had tested, and had come out with an enhanced reputation. He had in turn occupied nearly all the important positions in the Bulgarian army, and had everywhere displayed the same high qualities as leader and organizer. As far back as 1885, when he was still a young captain, the responsibilities of a general were thrust upon him, and as commander of the left wing of the Bulgarian army at the battle of Slivitsa he proved himself a brave leader no less than a consummate tactician.

As Leader of Men

A few years later, when the all-powerful Stambouloff was looking for a man to undertake the task of reorganizing the Bulgarian army, his choice fell upon Savoff, who, as Minister of War, endowed the then Principality with a military force in conformity with all the modern requirements. Bulgaria was then traversing stormy days, and dangers threatened the country on all sides. The ambition of two ministers was to inaugurate an independent national policy; and the success of these efforts could only be ensured by making of Bulgaria a military force that could not be safely neglected.

Soldiers were then also politicians; and General Savoff, who had quarrelled with the dictator, was temporarily driven into private life, dragging in his fall the omnipotent premier. He had, however, made his mark as a first-rate organizer, and his reputation for energy and his sense of justice. Here he was to win fresh titles, which soon secured for him the enviable position of head of the Military Academy in Sofia. For a man who was born a leader of men there could be nothing more attractive than the delicate mission of training future leaders; and to the performance of his new duties he brought the same enthusiasm and energy which had distinguished his former work. He seemed to instill a new life into that institution, and to impart to his pupils the same restless activity which forms the principal trait of his own character.

### NAPOLEON'S COMPASS RESTORED TO FRANCE

Paris, Nov. 29.—A relic which decided the fate of empires and the lives of millions has just been presented by the Grand Duke Nicholas Michaelovich of Russia to the historical collection at Malmaison. It is the simple ivory compass embossed with silver which Napoleon used in studying maps during all his campaigns. The compass has a history. It belonged to Baron Nathaniel de Rothschild, of Vienna, who had but some "object of historical value" during a luncheon when the Grand Duke was his guest in his yacht at Cannes. The Grand Duke had forgotten the incident but after the death of Baron Nathaniel de Rothschild he received the compass in 1888, with a note of its history, stating that it came originally from Malmaison.
