Reclamation of the large area at the south end for factory sites for T. McVety & Sons, Halsey Bros. & Co., and shape others. Erection of the sugar refinery, which is cost from \$2,500,000 to \$3,000,000. Erection of two great warehouses on Foster street, one six and the other eight stories high. Increase of 50 per cent in the capacity of the Parisington pulp mill.

Extension of the street railway line and consequent extension of the residential portion of the city. Probable of initial expenditure in connection with steel works and shipbuilding. The extension of a natural gas supply to St. John. Establishment of a large cement plant. Expansion of the New Brunswick Hydro-Electric Company in connection with that new source of heat, light, and power.

Industrial activity increased by the two new iron factories, the automobile factory, the enlarged confectionery works and a west side foundry. Construction of the new marine dock at the west side. Erection of the new Bank of British North America, the complete remodeling of the buildings purchased by the Merchants Bank of Canada and the Quebec Bank, with the erection of new buildings for the Bank of Montreal and the Royal Bank.
