MORNING LOCALS

Fire broke out in the St. John Iron Works at the foot of Sydney street last evening and in response to box 47 the city fire apparatus was soon on the scene and had the fire under control before any great damage was wrought.

The Board of Trade passed a resolution yesterday instructing Secretary Henry T. Hoag to attend the furniture exposition and convention now being held in New York. Mr. Hoag will endeavor to interest the manufacturers in St. John with a view to having them locate here.

A bicycle, the property of Raleigh Myers, 41 Cranston Avenue, was stolen from the upper floor of the Magee building yesterday. The loss was reported to the police. After a thorough search, the bicycle was found on Mill street, where the thief had left it.

The new water main from Marsh Bridge to Mount Pleasant has been completed and the water turned on, giving a greatly improved service.

Mayor Prink will be in charge of the department of public safety until Commissioner McEllan, who left for Boston last evening, returns. While in Boston the commissioner will devote some time to investigating the fire boat system in use there.

The Kane's corner extension of the St. John street railway will be in use sometime in August, according to a statement made by H. M. Hopper, general manager of the company, yesterday.

The difficulty in securing the diamond rail cross-overs for the Intercolonial railway crossing at Haymarket Square is given as the reason for the present delay. These should be here not later than August 1.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

The resignation of Chas. S. Melles as president of the New York, New Haven, and Hartford Railway has been accepted. A committee has been appointed to find a new man.

One man was burned to death at Boston yesterday when the wooden side-whipper, "City of Bangor," of the E. S. S. Co.'s line was badly damaged by fire. Captain Charles Blair had a narrow escape. The steamer which is valued at \$200,000, was burned in several places, the loss being estimated at \$50,000.

A conference of provincial premiers will be held at Ottawa on August 29, when such questions as provincial representation, increased federal subsidies to the provinces, and incorporation of inter-provincial companies, will be discussed.

An heroic rescue took place yesterday on the very brink of the Niagara Falls on the American side, when Truman Chapman, who had toppled over, was pulled from death by four men. They formed a human chain, but it was almost with superhuman effort that the rescue was effected. A break in the chain meant the loss of at least two and possibly three lives. Chapman revived in about an hour after being taken ashore.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Mahoney at Mac's Bay, N. B., was destroyed by fire on Wednesday last with heavy loss to the owners. It is thought the fire started from a defective chimney. Practically all the furniture in the house was destroyed. Harry and David Mahoney, brothers of Frederick, who had resided with him, lost \$140 in cash between them.

Customs officers at Woodstock seized a very valuable horse on Wednesday. The animal belongs to an American customs officer named Burns, of Fort Fairfield, Maine. The owner has been in Woodstock trying to arrange the matter, but the department will only accept a settlement on payment of \$1,000. Burns is the officer who figured in the famous Kelly case at the "Line" some years ago.

COMPTROLLER'S REQUEST
FOR THE CLOSED DOOR WAS
NOT COMPLIED WITH

Says a Calgary despatch:—

Another attempt to have the newspapers of Calgary gagged was made at a meeting of the executive and finance committee to discuss the auditor's report on Wednesday afternoon, when Comptroller Wood requested that reporters be excluded from the sessions, stating that unless this was done officials appearing before the committee, including the reporters, would keep their mouths closed. The committee did not take action.

The reason why Mr. Wood wanted the reporters barred he did not state. His request, however, gave the impression that somebody had "done things" which might lower him in the estimation of the ratepayers if given publicity, and because of that, the confessions would not be made if the reporters were there. "You have got to protect us from the press," he declared.

"The city solicitor says you can meet in secret session to discuss this matter, and if something is not done to protect the officials who will come before you, they will keep their mouths shut," asserted Mr. Wood.

The reporters were admitted, however, and proceeded to give Mr. Wood's report due publicity.
