Therefore, in the opinion of this toard, it is necessary that the Intercolonial Railway, without further delay or postponement, should acquire the branch line railways, adjacent to it in this province, and that the service of the Intercolonial should be extended into those sections of its territory which require railway facilities to stimulate their growth and the development of their resources.

Mr. McCord spoke briefly to the motion raising the question of the visdom of re-populating this country without doing something to remedy the cause of the decline of our population. In his opinion, one of the most potent reasons why New Brunswick was not making the progress which it should was the lack of better railway facilities.
