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LOCAL NEWS

SACKVILLE THRESHES OUT ST. JOHN BOARD OF TRADE POLICY

(Continued from page 1.)

Therefore, in the opinion of the board, it is necessary that the Intercolonial Railway, without further delay or postponement, should acquire the branch line railways, adjacent to it in this province, and that the service of the Intercolonial should be extended into those sections of its territory which require railway facilities to stimulate their growth and the development of their resources.

Mr. McCord spoke briefly to the motion raising the question of the wisdom of repopulating this country without doing something to remedy the cause of the decline of our population. In his opinion, one of the most potent reasons why New Brunswick was not making the progress which it should was the lack of better railway facilities. Albert county for instance was practically a blank because the railway service through that county was very bad.

It was noteworthy he said, that when our federal representation had been reduced the counties to suffer were those where the railway service was unsatisfactory. Mr. McCord expressed himself as being in entire sympathy with the resolution of the St. John board of trade, but he pointed out that it was very important to remedy the conditions which had caused our people to leave their native born, annually. Mr. McCord emphasized the necessity of the branch railways being acquired by the Intercolonial. His resolution was seconded by C. C. Avard.

W. B. Fawcett introduced the following resolution, which was seconded by Mr. McCord, and the resolution was adopted by a large majority of the board.

Resolved, that the St. John Board of Trade.

Whereas, the census shows that a large percentage of the immigrants brought into New Brunswick by government expenditure stay only a short time, while thousands of our native born, annually leave their farms to settle in the United States, the Canadian west or our provincial towns;

Therefore, resolved that any proposed increased expenditure by our local government for immigration purposes be postponed a year or two, and in the meantime our local government take immediate action to remedy all those adverse conditions (within the scope of provincial legislation) which are driving the people away from our farms, lands, and homes, and to remedy the same by the following means:—

1. To acquire by purchase or otherwise, all the branch railways now operated by the Intercolonial Railway Company, and to operate them as a public utility, and to make such improvements as may be necessary to make them comparable with other forms of taxable wealth and income; also the inequality of our system of land taxation, as well as school privileges; also, the unequal distribution of road taxes and road improvements.

And further, be it resolved that our provincial government take immediate action to remedy all those adverse conditions (within the scope of provincial legislation) which are driving the people away from our farms, lands, and homes, and to remedy the same by the following means:—

Ship money to the amount of \$4.85 or thereabouts was a trifle that cost a tyrant king his head.

A tax on tea amounting to about 6 cents per pound was another trifle that cost King George his North American colony.

A bilingual postage stamp is also a trifle that would fill the seats of the patient members for Toronto and other parts of English-speaking Canada with representatives of an Anglo-Saxon objection to being governed on the lines of surrender to the racial extremists of Quebec.
