be necessary to notify property holders by registered letter. This, he said, would entail considerable cost and then there also would be outstanding taxes to look after, which would further increase the expenses.

Ald. O'Neill said he was of the same opinion as Reeve Fleet. He mentioned that it was necessary for the Collector to pay repeated visits to some places. He was of the opinion that money would not be saved by having either the Treasurer or a bank do the collecting.

Mayor MacKay pointed out that extra duties had been imposed on the Treasurer owing to the municipality being in the power business and that it was doubtful if he would have the

time to do additional work.

After hearing these explanations Ald. Partio withdrew his objection, and the blank in the by-law was filled in as stated above.

WANTED THOROUGH AUDIT.

In connection with the appointment of auditors Ald. Partio said he wanted a thorough audit of the town's books in order that the members of the council and every citizen might know exactly where the money has gone. He could not make head or tail out of the financial statement. He believed that every account that came before the council should be published in the press that the people might know what was being done with their money. Exhibiting a statement he said there were several things about it he did not understand. He called attention to the contingent account of \$1,600 and asked "what was this money

paid out for. I would like to have it pointed out where this money has gone. The contingent account looks very much like a sliding place in which to put amounts they don't want the public to know anything about." The speaker also referred to the large account of the Board of Works. He also expressed the opinion that the Board of Education should curtail expenses. Continuing Mr. Partio said, "I for one would like to see this audit made very plain and straight from the beginning to the end, showing every dollar that has been spent."

Reeve Fleet suggested that Ald. Partio get a copy of the auditors' last report. This report he said, which could be obtained from the Clerk gave just such information as Mr. Partio desired. It gave the name, he said, of every man who had been paid a dollar.

Mayor MacKay said the council had

not been hiding or overlooking anything. Every account published had been accounted for, and published in the press. Some years ago, he believed when Ald. Partio was in the council there was some gambling with the sinking fund and it was necessary to get special legislation to consolidate the accounts. He remembered the fact very well as he had put the bill through.

Replying, Ald. Partio stated he was not a member of the council at the time the special legislation was secured.

Speaking from the chair, Deputy Reeve Walley said he could not see any way to pay off the \$25,000 side-walk debentures, which came due this year, except the council raise about \$3,800 which is the amount of a shortage caused by the difference in the interest rate the first few years the debentures were issued, which

leaves the sinking fund about this amount short, and which will take about two mills.

This concluded the discussion and the bylaw was finally passed.

ENQUIRIES.

Under this head Deputy Reeve Walley stated he understood letters re natural gas came before the old council. He wanted to know what disposition had been made of these letters. If they were on file he would like to have them produced at the next meeting.

A motion carried that the Clerk have committee cards printed for the use of the council.

The sum of ten dollars was donated to the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto.

An adjournment was made at 9 o'clock.
