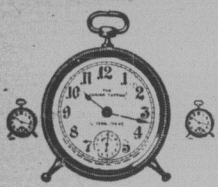

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HALL WAS FILLED AT A DOUBLE GAME

At Liberal Meeting at Beachville—Reciprocity Endorsed by H. F. Davis, Prominent Conservative.

HELPING THE NATIONALISTS

The Premier in His Address at New Glasgow Produces an Anti-Imperial Pamphlet Which He Says Has Been Distributed Among the French at the Expense of Enemies of Reciprocity Pact.

New Glasgow, N.S., Sept. 1.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier concluded his triumphal tour of Nova Scotia last night with another long-to-be-remembered demonstration. Eight thousand enthusiastic men and women thronged the great arena and hundreds were turned away. So great was the competition for places of vantage that two hundred men climbed to the rafters and announced themselves in this advantageous if perilous position. Nova Scotia holds that well enough is not good enough when we can do better. The slogan which occupied the platform. It is the keynote of public sentiment in this province.

En route to New Glasgow he held three meetings, speaking to the Hants electors at Shubenacadie, to the Colchester people at Truro, and the constituency of Pictou at Stollarton.

In the course of his New Glasgow address, Sir Wilfrid produced a copy of Le Devoir of July 13, and a reproduction of the pamphlet which he read, which he read, and had intruded with Chamberlain to carry on their ambitious Imperial projects through this "infamous war."

"What has this to do with the present issue before the Canadian people?" queried Sir Wilfrid. "It has this to do with it, my fellow-countrymen. I charge that the anti-reciprocity Conservatives entered into an unholy alliance with Mr. Bourassa and the Nationalists in an effort to defeat the Government at this time. The Montreal Herald, which has been investigating the circumstances surrounding the promulgation of the article I have read you, advises us, and publishes the statement that the distribution of this article in the parishes of my native province is being financed and paid for by the anti-reciprocity Conservative party in Montreal. You are told by these gentlemen that I am conspiring to betray Imperial interests and British connections; my compatriots are told by the same gentlemen that I am conspiring with and for British Imperialists. What does a man mean? What is his purpose? Perhaps Mr. Borden or Mr. Bourassa can tell."

Sir Wilfrid concluded amid a tempest of cheering with the declaration that his dual creed was Canada and British connection.

Will Hold Joint Debate.

Ottawa, Sept. 1.—Henri Bourassa will speak at Hull on Sept. 5, and the meeting will develop into a joint debate between Bourassa and E. B. Devlin, K.C., Liberal candidate in Wright County. Mr. Devlin announced yesterday that he would certainly appear on the platform in answer to Mr. Bourassa.

Premier's Ontario Tour.

Ottawa, Sept. 1.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier speaks in Alexandria on Monday night, going thence for another tour through Ontario, in which he will be heard at Cobourg, Sudbury, Collingwood and Stratford. Afterwards the Premier will return to Quebec. In Quebec City he will deliver an address in French and speak at Drummond-Arthabaska, Montmagny, Megantic, Rimouski and Champlain.

Nominations.

Lachute, Que., Sept. 1.—G. H. Perley, the Conservative whip, was again re-elected the unanimous choice of the Liberal-Conservative convention here yesterday afternoon. It was significant that the larger number of the delegates were farmers and the way they cheered the strong anti-reciprocity speeches showed that the agreement is not popular in this section of the province.

Aviator Badly Hurt.

Freeport, Ill., Sept. 1.—Fred. Heegles, 26 years of age, an amateur aviator of Chicago, was probably fatally injured and a number of spectators were hurt Wednesday when Heegles' biplane fell fifty feet during an exhibition flight. The exhibition was for the benefit of Mrs. Daniel Kramer, whose husband was killed a short time ago while trying for a pilot's license in Chicago. None of the spectators were severely injured.

Chicago Fireman Hurt.

Chicago, Sept. 1.—Fighting against flames which swept through a four-story building in the downtown district yesterday, ten firemen were slightly injured by an explosion of chemicals, and before the fire was extinguished \$100,000 worth of property was burned. The greatest loss was suffered by the Jenner Medical Co. and a manufacturer of beer pumps, the principal occupants of the building.
