It is very infrequently, however that the demolition of a steeple is wit-nessed and the uncommon sight was awaited by a large group of citizens on Broad street yesterday and to-day. The one in question is one of the oldest and handsomest in the city, namely that of the old Methodist church on Pandora and Broad streets. Contractor Moore had succeeded in removing most of the structure, but the lofty spire still stood as if reluctant to forfeit the conspicuous place it has occupied for upward of half a century. To lestroy it the contractor sawed through its graceful lines about thirty-five feet from the top, and at an angle which assisted in throwing it inward into the body of the religious temple, of which it has long been the chief ornament.
In addition to the ordinary crowd the attempt to pull it inward by means of ropes was closely followed by the city building inspector, Mr. Northcott, the contractor, Mr. Moore, the new owner, Mr. Ker, and F.
