

A MENACING SIGN

Coast Guardsmen Far About Great Britain Ordered Ready for Mobilization.

France to Get Nothing in Egypt—Marchand Now Due at Cairo.

London, Nov. 3.—The fact that the coast guardsmen throughout the United Kingdom have been warned to be ready for mobilization is regarded as a menacing sign. Many of them have already joined their ships.

London, Nov. 3.—The Rt. Hon. Jas. Bryce, former under-secretary of state for foreign affairs, subsequently president of the board of trade, and now member of parliament in the Liberal interest for Aberdeen, speaking yesterday afternoon, endorsed the Egyptian stand in the Fashoda controversy, declaring that "the military control of all the navigable waters in the Bah-el-Ghazal basin, as well as the Nile must be secured to Egypt."

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RUPTURE IMMINENT.

Expect That Peace Negotiations Between Spain and Great Britain Will End to-Morrow.

Russia Utters a Threat—German Opinion Unfavorable to America's Contentions.

London, Nov. 3.—The Paris correspondent of the Morning Post says: "It is expected that a rupture of the peace negotiations between the United States and Spain will be officially announced on Friday. The feeling here is that the attitude of the Spaniards is irrational in view of the financial proposals of the United States."
