The bodies of Carter and his wife, the first recovered, were found under the crushed roof of their home, while the mangled body of their child was found 15 feet away. Mrs. Flora Woods, 2424 South Third Street, was found unconsolous 70 feet from her home. She had her small baby clasped in her arms.

On account of the appailing character of the catastrophe, only a few names of the dead and injured were available.
