FREDERICK, Monday 18th.
The past week has been signified by the resignation of all the members of the Government except Hon. Charles Fisher, in consequence of Mr. Fisher's having obtained Crown Lands in violation of the regulations of the G. L. Department. Mr. Fisher, it is understood, declined to resign his office in the government as requested by his colleagues preferring to run the chance of being called upon to form another administration, even though compelled to throw himself into the arms of the opposition. It appears, however, that even the honor of attempting an impossibility was not vouchsafed to Mr. Fisher. The resignation of Messrs. Tilley, Waters, Brown, Steeles, Stidman, Mitchell, Smith and Waik, were not accepted by the Governor and it seems to be understood that Fisher will be dismissed by His Excellency the same as any other public official. Of course, the Governor must act in this matter with the consent of his Council and no doubt the announcement will show that he has done so and that Mr. Fisher is no longer Attorney General.

I observe that the "Freeman" is endeavouring to prove that Mr. Tilley of today, contradicts Mr. Tilley of 1858 with regard to his Crown Lands. Mr. Tilley, in the Session of 1858, March 8th, stated as follows:—[I quote from the "Official Debates"]—"As far as he was personally concerned while a member of the Government or Legislature, he had never made application for a piece of land under the 'Labor Act' or any other Act."

FIRES.—On Thursday evening a fire broke out in the millinery establishment of the Misses Cummings, Market Square, but was extinguished with little damage.

Some hours later another fire occurred in the saw mill owned by Gas Stewart & Co near the Marsh Bridge. Notwithstanding the exertions of the firemen the building was totally consumed. The fire is supposed to have been the work of an incendiary. A reward of \$2000 is offered for his apprehension.

NEW BUILDINGS.—Messrs. Ennis and Gardner are about erecting an elegant four story stone and brick store on the lot beyond the Imperial Buildings, Prince William Street. On Chipman's Hill, in the same street, the new Bank of British North America is shortly to be proceeded with. The contract has been taken by Messrs. Fenety and Raymond at \$3,750.

BREACH OF PROMISE CASE.—This interesting case, Smith vs. Clementson, which occupied the court for six days, was concluded by a verdict for the plaintiff. Damages assessed at \$3000 and costs amounting to \$200. Much interest was manifested by the public generally in the result of this trial. Of the weekly Freeman, of Thursday, containing a report of the proceedings, nearly 4,500 copies were sold.

MANUFACTURES AT SAINT JOHN.—Of late years our citizens have been devoting more attention to the making at home of many articles formerly imported wholly from abroad. Stoves and castings of all kinds, nails, machinery, soap and candles, brushes, brooms, pails, paper, cabinet ware and furniture, and numerous other articles have for some time been extensively manufactured in this city. The new company for the manufacture of wollen and cotton goods, at St. John, are erecting with great success. Upwards of \$5000 worth of cloth has been sold within a short time, and orders are constantly coming in. Before long, in all probability, our importations of the coarser descriptions of wollen and cotton fabrics will be put to an end. New establishments are spoken of, among which we notice one for the manufacture of boots and shoes on a large scale, and a cotton factory.

MIRACLES.—Strong exhortations are being made for the establishment of a bank at Chatham—£12,000 have been subscribed in that locality.

ROMAN CATHOLIC DONATION.—The amount of money sent to the Pope from this Province, is said to have been £761 8s 2d.

MONSTERS.—The civic elections have taken place. Joseph Crandall, Esq. was elected Mayor, and Messrs. T. M. Lockhart, W. Trenholm, E. McCarthy, W. Robertson, J. Rank, and J. W. Outton, Councilors for the ensuing year.

FIRES AT BUTCHERS.—A fire occurred at a thriving village last week, attended with a large amount of loss. The large three story building occupied by Mr. Atkinson, with all its contents, was totally destroyed, and there is no insurance. Several other buildings were also much injured.

BEARD ACROSS THE PENTACON.—We learned from the Montreal Times that a meeting has been held in Coverdale Parish, and a Company formed for the purpose of erecting this Bridge. A subscription list is to be opened for subscribers, and a petition for aid sent to the Legislature.

A RARE DISCOVERY.—The Head Quarters contains the following:—During the latter part of last week, Messrs. Shaw and Segge, while engaged in lumbering operations in the New Maryland Settlement, were attracted to a large hollow pine by a humming noise. Struck by the strangeness of the circumstance, they at once felled the tree, and discovered a nest of tame bees about 50 feet from the butt, from which they extracted 94 lbs. of pure honey. That portion of the tree containing the bees is safely secured in which a large quantity of honey still remains undisturbed.

FREDERICK.—In addition to the startling developments of doings in the Crown Land office, the public have had their attention unpleasantly attracted to affairs in the Provincial University. The President, Dr. Hea, has had the misfortune to incur the dislike of the students. Grave charges have been brought against him, which have been investigated by the Governor, as Visitor, and the Senate of the University. It is said that the greater portion of the students have refused to remain if the President is retained in his position.

NOVA SCOTIA.—We learn from the Halifax Reporter that small pox is raging to a considerable extent in that city. Some 20 or 30 new cases are reported weekly. Three cases have appeared at Truro.

DIPHTHERIA.—A private letter to us from Wallace Bay, Nova Scotia, gives a number of melancholy instances of families heavily afflicted with the terrible diphtheria. On the South side of the Bay, a Mr. Galt Peers lately lost five children; his brother Ezekiel Peers lost a daughter, a fine young woman, and another brother, Barney Peers, lost two daughters, young women.—Rosa Weekly.

SUBMERGED CANAL.—It is said that Mr. J. Luckie, late of the firm of Johnston & Blackie, contractors, has taken the contract for constructing the additional locks required at Dartmouth, for the completion of the long talked of Submergible canal. Mr. Blackie is well known in New Brunswick.

POST OFFICE AT MALPASS.—The Clerks in this Department have petitioned the Government for an increase of salary. Their memorial is strongly recommended by the Postmaster General and has been placed before the Post Office Committee. It will probably be favourably considered.

DISASTROUS FIRE.—Pearcie's Hotel, at Middleton, Annapolis County, was destroyed by fire a few days ago, with all its contents. The inmates barely escaped with their lives.

EMBEZZLING IN N. S.—We learn from the Halifax Colonist that Mr. Stewart Campbell, a member of the Nova Scotia Assembly, is arraigned before a committee of the House on a charge of embezzling the road monies of his County.

VISIT OF PRINCE ALBERT.—It is said on good authority that H. M. S. St. George, having Prince Alfred on board will leave Bermuda for Halifax on the 1st of June, accompanied by H. M. flag ship Ibis, Rear Admiral Sir Alexander Miles.

DIPHTHERIA.—This terrible malady is becoming quite prevalent in the island. Many cases have occurred in Charlottetown, some of which terminated fatally.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.—A new Market House is to be erected in Ch'ntown. The dimensions are as follows:—Length 100 feet, breadth 50 feet, height 30 feet; the edifice to be of brick. We understand that premiums for the three best architectural designs are to be offered first £10, second £7 10 shillings and £5.

NEW TELEGRAPH CABLE.—The Telegraphic communication with the Continent having ceased since the destruction of the Cable, the Islanders are anxious to have a new one laid. Ross's Weekly Remarks:—"The probability is that unless our Legislators do something in the matter, the inhabitants of P. E. Island will hereafter be deprived of the benefit of telegraphic communication with the mainland."

STEAM TO CASQUEPEC.—The people of Casquepec are desirous of steam communication with Shediac and have petitioned the Legislature for a subsidy. If their petition be granted the Princess Royal will be on the route early in the spring. The advantages of steam to the northern section of P. E. I. will be very great to the inhabitants, and largely increase the traffic on our Railroad.

FROM NEWFOUNDLAND.—A telegram received in Halifax states that the former Government were defeated. The Provisional Government was then formed under the leadership of Mr. Hoyle. But the conduct of the people in the House was so disgraceful that the Governor dissolved the House. It is stated that the behavior of the people in the Legislature was too indecent to be reported.

ICE OFF NEWFOUNDLAND.—Portland, 11th.—Stamship United States, which arrived Saturday from Glasgow, reports kept well to the South; experienced a continued succession of westerly gales; passed two icebergs and two extensive fields of ice on the banks.
