REVOLUTION WITHOUT WAR.

Panama Gets Freedom Without Any Bloodshed.

Colombian Troops Have Left the Country - United States Maintaining Order.

PARIS, Nov. 6.—The French foreign office today received a despatch from the French consul at Panama confirming the Associated Press despatches of resterday from that city and from Colon. The consul says: "Colon has now followed the course of Panama and is passing into the hands of the revolutionists. The transfer extended negotiations between the Colombian troops and the revolutionary element. This culminated yesterday evening when the Colombian troops surrendered and immediately embarked. The change co-curred without bloodshed. The United States gunboat Nashville and the transport Dixle with 450 American marines are co-operating with the railroad company in maintaining order. The new state assumes all the former treaty and legal obligations of Colombia."

The last information is regarded by the officials here as being most important, as showing no disposition on the part of the new republic of Panama to repudiate the canal or other property rights acquired from Colombia. WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—The navy department has received a despatch from Commander Delino of the Dixie, announcing his arrival at Colon. The cablegram states that the Colombian troops have evacuated and that the situation is quiet.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—The navy department has received a cablegram from Rear Admiral Glass, commanding the Pacific squadron, announcing the departure of the Marblehead, Concord and Wyoming and the coilier Nero yesterday at Acapulio, Mexico, for Panama. The squadron is proceeding at full speed.

LABOR RIOT IN PARIS

Protest Meeting Breaks Up In a Fight Between Police and Mob-Many Injured.

LYONS, France, Nov. 6.—A meeting yesterday in the Bourse de Travail to protest against the present system of employment agencies and the alleged brutality of the police in Paris was followed by a rather serious riot after the meeting. The demonstrators paraded the city until they came up with a force of mounted guards. Some persons fired a revolver and the rioting commenced. Paving stones and lumps of coal, stolen from a nearby factory, were hurled at the guards and police. This was followed by more shooting. Many of the police were injured and one sergeant had his skull fractured. Finally the police with drawn sabres charged the rioting, wounding several of them and dispersing the mob. Several arrests were made.

NEGRO BRUTE LYNCHED

Mexican Clerical Party Blames the Arrested After Criminally Assaulting White Woman, But Meb Tore Him From Guarded Jail.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Nov. 6—Sam Adams, a young negro, criminally assuited Mrs. Peter Ladusse, at Pass Christian, Miss., yesterday. He cut loose the horses from her carriage while she was strolling in a field with nurse and child, and lured her from her companions under pretense of securing the animals. He escaped, but was captured and last night a mob took him from the jail, which had been guarded by armed men as a precaution, and hanged him to a tree. The officers intended taking him to Mississippi city for safe keeping, but the mob overpowered them. CITY OF MEXICO, Nov. 6.-There is great public interest here in the Pana-ma revolution and the undercurrent of talk in clerical party circles, where Coiombia is regarded as in sympathy with the clerical party programme, is that the authorities are the secret premoters of the disturbance and are planning to annex the Panama district to the United States. The clerical organ with a wide circulation here, El Tiempo, is indignant over the news from Panama, and says in part: "It is believed not to be merely another revolution added to the list of those which have occurred in South America, but as a certain prelude to a terrible blow which is apt to unfold itself on the coveted isthmus and which will end, perhaps, with the dismemberment of the unhappy Colombian nation and the augmentation of prestige and power of the United States on the American continent." The paper, in conclusion, charges that the revolution is probably directly the result of resentment which statesmen and politicians of the United States experienced at the flasco of the Hay-Herran treaty, and says it is but another exemplification of perfidy of the Saxon race. Emperor William's Meteor Will Compete in Race Across Atlantie in the Spring.

BERLIN, Nov. 6.—Emperor William's schooner yacht Meteor will go to the United States in the spring to take part in the ocean yacht race for His Majesty's cup. Several changes have been ordered in her rig, the most important of which is a reduction of her sail area, so as to avoid being heavily handicapped. The Meteor was sailed by an all-English crew two seasons ago and was handled by a crew of English and German sailors during the races of June last. She will sail in the trans-Atlantic race with an all-German crew on board. The emperor's views regarding the advantage of the race, as they have been outlined to naval officers here, is that yachts of the cruiser type are of greater utility than racing models and that the strength of construehere, is that yachts of the cruiser type are of greater utility than racing mo-dels and that the strength of construc-tion, discipline of the crews, varieties of weather and skill in sailing under what may be called service conditions, are best tested in a trans-oceanic race.
