"The Japs will win, they must win, and they are a unanimous nation," said C. Neville Cross, an English barrister living in Japan and lately arrived at the Windsor Hotel. He was dapper in appearance and spake in dapper in appearance and spoke in sharp incisive and confident manner. Dealing with the war correspondent problem that looms so large in the Brithe lessons of South Africa had not fighting for their lives and no precau was neglected. Their government's attitude in this war was an epitome of


