FOOTBALL.

Some fine material is turning out for the senior practices in football. Yesterday afternoon Capt. The encouraging feature is the proportion of new material that is fast whipping into shape. Emerson, formerly of the Pennsylvania University is showing up well in his tackling and punting, and will be a source of strength to the backs. White is another strong punter that has not been seen on the St. John grounds before this season. Coll and Harrison are old university players and only need practice to get back into their former style. As there were not enough men present to form two teams last night practice in punting, following up the ball and dribbling, formed the afternoon's work.

From present indications it is likely that a game will be arranged for next Saturday afternoon between this team and Naptone intermediates, who are anxious to try conclusions with any senior team that may be brought here. The game will take place immediately after the regular league game between Carleton and Fairville.
