GILLETTE HAD

THE TIME OF HIS LIFE

Condemned Murderer Enjoyed a Giddy Day
With a Lot of Chorus Girls

AUBURN, N. Y., Dec. 12.—Prison officials succeeded pretty well in fooling a thousand people who had assembled at the central station this afternoon to catch a glimpse of C. E. Gillette. Having made preparations to stop the train on the outskirts of the city, prison guards in uniform were still sent to the station while the warden's private equipage with Principal Keeper Tupper and two guards was sent to Perrine street crossing, where the train stopped and Gillette Sheriff Klock or Hordner at the carriage.

The team was driven rapidly through the streets to the north corridor where he was previous to being taken to the condemned cells. There was not the slightest air of fear or of emotion of any kind as he walked along the hall way at the office of the principal keeper. He was formally turned over to authorities. Sheriff Klock was telegrams announcing arrival at the prison at 2:17 the formal work of sent prisoner was done.

Gillette's pockets were of their contents and the two apples, a magazine and buttons and sleeve links, in a pile. His clothing was removed and the search "All right," said Gillette Sheriff Klock, "find out if he can have sent to me. All right matter."

"You can't have any principal keeper Tupper."

"And about the visit, I'm addressing the sheriff."

"Can I have anyone visit me?"

"No one but your lawyer."

"And about my mother?"

"Yes, she can see you," replied principal keeper Tupper.

"She'll be here, probably tomorrow."

"Is that your overcoat?" asked Sheriff Klock.

"No," said Gillette, "I have a new one."

"No," replied the prisoner, "Mr. Klock will take that back."

By this time the searching was finished. He was hurried down through the wing to the bathroom where he was bathed, given new clothing and his hair cut. He was assigned to cell No. 2.

Gillette does not impress one as out

of the ordinary. He is short, stubbly built, with dark hair that hangs straight and with dark eyes. His face is round and thick, his lips being full and sensual. He would pass as an ordinary man in the outside world, and as an ordinary type inside the prison. There was nothing to distinguish him. Gillette's calmness was the most noteworthy thing of his reception. One looking at him would not think that he was under the sentence of death.

On the train Gillette rode in the special car of the "runaways" come opera troupe, which shows here tonight. Those who watched him said he had "the time of his life." The girls in the troupe crowded around him and the man in the shadow of the chair sat and talked and laughed with them. He also tore up slips of paper, wrote his name on them and handed them to the girls as souvenirs.

Gillette's mother will be here tomorrow and with her will be Gillette's sister, Miss Hazel Gillette, of Zion City.

STARVES TO DEATH

Harding His Money for Years, Dr. Goessling's End Comes Surrounded by Poverty

TROY, N. Y., Dec. 12.—After years of sordid living, spent in the accumulation of a fortune which he never enjoyed, except possibly to gloat over the money amassed, Dr. Frederick Goessling died early this morning. He had lived alone and in a wretched condition. He literally starved himself to death.

Dr. Goessling was worth \$75,000, largely cash, although he owned several valuable pieces of property in the city. When found he furnished every evidence of neglect of person and environment. Ashes were piled up on the floor of the one room which he had used as a general living room. His bed was a cot with nothing but a blanket on it, and without pillows.

Dr. Goessling for years subsisted on bread and vegetables and very little of those. He lived only to hoard money away in the bank.

Neighbors noticed that the physician had not returned out of the house the last day or two, and finally an entrance was effected to the room.

Dr. Goessling was lying dead on the hand cot with little clothing. Investigation revealed several bank books showing deposits of large sums of money in Troy banks. The money available was in the neighborhood of \$45,000, and this with the real estate property makes the estate inventory at about \$75,000.

Dr. Goessling was about sixty years old and had been a resident of Troy for many years, coming to this city from Germany early in the sixties, when yet a young man. He graduated from a German University, and upon arriving in this country entered the medical department of the University of Pennsylvania, from which institu-

tion he was graduated. He was also a minister of the gospel. Leaving the university came to Troy, where he had several German friends, and became the pastor of the German Lutheran Trinity church, and King street, a church in 1873, he went back to Germany to take up several different branches in the university from which he first graduated, and upon his return to this country, a few years later, he began the practice of medicine.

Dr. Goessling spoke French, German, Italian and English.

Dr. Goessling was married soon after coming to Troy upon his return from abroad, but his wife died several years later. He has one daughter, now living in Germany, and a brother, Dr. E. Goessling, of Allegheny City, Pa.

FIANCE UPOLDS

GIRL FOR SHOOTING

Miss McAtee, Who Fired Two Bullets into the Body of Her Father, a Minister, Is Released

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Dec. 12.—Miss May McAtee, accused of attempting to kill her father, the Rev. John Quincy McAtee, in their home, at No. 1714 South Fifth street, yesterday, was arraigned before Magistrate Eisenbrow today and held in \$1,000 bail for a further hearing on December 24.

Detective Linden testified that Miss McAtee had admitted shooting her father in defence of her mother, whom he was beating; that the wounds are not serious, and that the injured man will probably be able to leave the hospital in ten days. Jacob Marcus, a friend of the family, furnished bail, and Miss McAtee was released.

After the ordeal was over Miss McAtee received a huge bunch of American Beauty roses from a woman relative. She then hastened away from court with her mother and Robert W. Pierce, her fiancé. Hiding her goodby were her brother-in-law, Henry G. Swayne, friends and relatives.

When out of sight of the curious the girl fell on her sweetheart's breast and wept while he folded his arms around her. This scene lasted for several minutes.

Subsequently Mr. Pierce said that he had known for some time of the Rev. Mr. McAtee's alleged abuse of Mrs. McAtee and her daughter.

FIANCE EXPLAINS

"On Thanksgiving night," said Mr. Pierce, "May and I went to a theatre. Returning we found May's mother on the steps of the house. She said that her husband had thrown her down a short flight of stairs on the second floor and that he had pushed her and kicked her. She was afraid to stay in the house with him, she said."

"I went in, but they would not let me go up to see him. We all stayed on the first floor until morning, fearing an attack. On the next day, after I had gone, May spoke to her father and asked him not to molest her mother. This made the father angry again and he hurled an iron bootjack at May. When this missed he grabbed her around the waist and tried to throw her over the balustrade to the first

JUROR CONVICTED

OF ACCEPTING BRIBE

BOSTON, Dec. 12.—Matthew F. Killian, a member of the jury which broke the will of Uriel H. Croker, a wealthy lawyer in this city so that his three sons were enabled to participate with their stepmother in the division of the property, was convicted today of receiving a bribe while serving on the panel, John W. Cronan, another member of the jury, who was tried with Killian on a similar charge, was acquitted.

The verdict in the Croker case was mentioned by District Attorney Moran in his campaign for office a year ago when he announced that he would use his efforts to convict alleged takers of bribes.

John W. Harnett, who, it was alleged, paid the money for influencing the verdict in the case, and who was indicted by the grand jury, disappeared shortly before the arrest of Killian and Cronan.

Uriel H. Croker died about three years ago leaving nearly his entire property to his second wife who was formerly a clerk in his office. The first attempt to break the will before a jury in the Supreme Court resulted in a disagreement. On a second trial the will was set aside and the property divided between Mrs. Croker and stepsons, one of whom was George U. Croker, formerly city treasurer.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 25, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:—

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
