The street work in the city was suspended yesterday as a result of the Board of Works having almost reached the limit of expenditure in this department. Scavenger work will still be carried on and also some asphaltting. The work of repaving the streets between the rails of the car tracks and eighteen inches on either side will be continued until completed, which will not be until well into the fall. This repaving is being done with money received from the St. John Railway Company. So far satisfactory progress has been made with the work on Main street, repairs having been made from the foot of Indian tower to Simonds street. King street has been completely macadamized and work has been begun on other macadamized streets.

\$25,000,000 LOSS BY FIRES IN BRITISH COLUMBIA FORESTS
Cherous Damage During Season—Heavy Rains Quenched Flames on Vancouver Island.
VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 4.—The heavy rains of the past few days have worked a considerable good in all but extinguishing the forest fires that have for weeks been raging in the Cowichan district and thence toward the heart of Vancouver Island. The fire centred in the vicinity of the Mount Sicker mining camp, where all save five buildings in what is quite a flourishing mining village went up in flames. The crown of the island's most accessible timber wealth has been licked up by the fires, and the C. P. R., the Victoria and Chemainus Lumber Company and the Cowichan and Ladysmith Lumber Companies are heavy sufferers, their losses running far into six figures.
It is estimated that forest fires this far this season throughout British Columbia have caused losses approximating \$25,000,000. The heaviest of these losses was in the Crown's Nest section, where the destruction of the Town of Fernis was a heavy contribution to the paralyzing total.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier left for Sorel today, where he will speak at a Liberal demonstration there tomorrow afternoon.
An order has been promulgated making it illegal to capture striped bass under two pounds weight in New Brunswick, between April 1st and Nov. 30th.
Fishing in five-inch gill nets and with rod for bass over two pounds is allowed.

FOUND IN RIDEAU CANAL
OTTAWA, Sept. 4.—The body of J. N. Carroll, a clerk in the office of the auditor general's office was taken from the Rideau canal this afternoon. He was a young man, a native of Inverness, N. S., and had been suffering from melancholia for some time. A few months ago he attempted to make away with himself by cutting his throat. Carroll has been missing since Monday.

COURTENAY BAY BORINGS ENDED
The Courtenay Bay borings are now completed with the exception of one or two near the harbor channel. These will be made early next week. Mr. Gray, the engineer in charge of the work, will then return to Ottawa immediately and his report on the composition of Courtenay Bay bottom will be made in the course of a few days.
Rough weather has seriously interfered with the taking of borings outside the mouth of the bay, but in spite of this the work has advanced sufficiently to enable it to be ascertained that absolutely no rock exists in the bay. Sand and clay are the only materials taken out in the borings. Later the boring apparatus has taken borings twenty feet below the required depth, but even then no rock was found. Nothing seems to exist which would prevent the bay being dredged so as to permit the construction of docks able to accommodate the largest vessels.
Inside the bay a ledge of rock exists on the western side, but in such a position that it would furnish excellent foundation for piers and would greatly facilitate their construction.

STAVERT BEGINS ACTION AGAINST SHAREHOLDERS
TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 4.—The five actions brought by W. E. Stavert, curator of the Sovereign Bank, against D. Campbell for \$25,000; James McPhee, for \$25,000; Donald McMillan and James McPhee for \$25,000; Donald D. McMillan for \$25,000; and Donald D. McMillan for \$25,000, were set down at Osgoode Hall today for trial at the non-jury session. The claims are made on unpaid promissory notes.
The defendants claim that notes were endorsed to the Sovereign Bank in condition that they should be fully indemnified by the bank in respect thereof.
The making and endorsing were illegal and void, as having been a device for concealing and covering up the fact that the bank had purchased its own stock, and enabling the bank to continue in the ownership of said stock. The defendants may ask to have the Sovereign Bank made a third party.

NEARLY DROWNED IN EFFORT TO SAVE DOG
Last night before the ferry boat left the Carleton wharf, a small boy narrowly escaped being drowned while attempting to save a dog which had fallen into the water.
The animal was struggling in the water and the boy, who was only about five years old, made frantic efforts to gain a foothold, but all efforts proved unavailing. After several attempts had been made it showed signs of exhaustion and its youthful master stood anxiously watching its unsuccessful endeavor. The boy tried to save his canine and crawled over the side, but there was very little to hold on to. His feet slipped on the wet logs and he fell some distance, but managed to save himself from dropping into the water by being wedged between the wharf and the side of the slip. In this position he sought help of the dog and friends assisted both to get back to safety.
