DRISCOLL APPEAL MAY BECOME CAUSE CELEBRE

MRS. RICHMOND CHARGED WITH MCTAVISH MURDER

Woman Accused of Killing P. E. I. Mac Will Probably Be Held for the Grand Jury BOSTON, Aug. 2.—Mrs. Elizabeth Richmond, accused of the murder of Stewart McTavish, was today brought to the East Cambridge court for the continued hearing. District Attorney John J. Higgins, who recently won a great victory in the celebrated trunk murder case, left his summer home at Provincetown last night for the government of personally handling the case today, but said this morning that he would not attempt to present the case prepared by the state as he does not wish to show his hand to the defense. A large number of witnesses were in court, but it is expected that not more than two or three will be called to testify as it is the District Attorney's purpose only to seek to have the woman held for the grand jury. Mrs. Richmond came in smiling and neatly clad, showing no ill effects from her confinement at the jail.

HEROIC RESCUE OF TWO ST. JOHN CHILDREN

Fourteen Year Old Gloucester Lad Saves William Ernest Haley of This City BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 2.—Fourteen year old James McDonald is today the hero of the summer colony at Gloucester, Mass. Yesterday afternoon William Ernest Haley, four and two years old, who recently arrived from St. John as guests of Mrs. Benjamin Roberts of Gloucester, wandered down to Green's Wharf and venturing too near the edge of the pier, in some way stumbled over into the water. Young McDonald heard the cries of the children and without stopping to remove his clothes, plunged over and managed to hold the two little ones out of the water until a summer resident in a motor boat arrived on the scene and pulled them all out to safety. The summer people are planning some sort of a medal for the young hero.

NO CANADIAN BOARD FOR GRAND TRUNK

Says Sir Charles Rivers Wilson MONTREAL, Aug. 2.—The question of the appointment of a Canadian board of directors in connection with the management of the Grand Trunk railway is one which never has been seriously considered by the management of the road on the other side of the Grand Trunk railway system, who arrived in Montreal last evening from Quebec. "It is not a fact that there has been considerable agitation for some time past on the other side for such a board. "Much has been written regarding the matter, but it has not been proven to us that such a board is necessary. London directors of the road have the greatest faith and confidence in the ability of Mr. Hays and the management of the Grand Trunk lies practically in his hands. The question of finance, however, is one which must remain on the other side."

BUYING AUTOS, BUT SKIMPING PENSIONS

U. S. Government Scold for Generosity in One Direction and Parsimony in the Other. WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 2.—The purchase of automobiles for the private use of government officials was made the subject of a severe attack by Mr. Sims, (Conn.) during consideration of the urgent deficiency appropriation bill in the house today. The senate amendment appropriating \$12,000 for the purchase of vehicles for the speaker and vice-president, as well as other disbursements were later discarded. Mr. Sims criticized the use of automobiles by his quartermaster's department and expressed his conviction that it was an outrage for the private use of officials while six and twelve dollar pensions were being paid to widows of soldiers and the salaries of clerks were pared down to reduce expenses.
