TOURIST RATES ON ST. JOHN AND WHAT HE SAW

Mr. Walter F. Starbuck, News Editor of the Waltham, Mass., Free Press-Tribune, writing in his paper on his trip this summer to the Maritime Provinces, has this to say of St. John and vicinity:

And now comes St. John, "the City of the Loyalists." One day in June, 104 years ago, a little French ship sailed from the Bay of Fundy into a harbor. Upon the deck stood Champlain and Demonts. They found the ruler of the old powder magazine and in honor of the day—the festival of St. John the Baptist—they named it the River St. John.

What is commonly known as St. John occupies the east bank of the river, but the city includes also Carleton situated on the opposite bank. Carleton is supposed to be where the French

MARKET SLIP, a water space open to the harbor at the west, and flanked with a long dock at the north, and another at the south. At low tide much of the water flows out ward and leaves the vessels
