WEDDING OF MISS LAWSON JOHANNESBURG



THE BRIDE.

Boston, Mass., Dec. 15.—Dorothy, third daughter of Thomas W. Lawson was married today to Henry Merion, son of Congressman Samuel W. McColl, of Winchester. The wedding took place at Dreamwood, Mr. Lawson's country house at Squan, and the decorations and festivities were those of a wintry Christmas, for which Monday's south shore storm which overburdened with snow every tree and shrub at Dreamwood, provided a superbly fitting background.

Ceremony on Veranda.

The wedding of Miss Lawson's eldest sister, Gladys, Eben Blaine (Stanwood) in October, 1905, was memorable for its golden harvest setting, and that of her other sister, Merion (Mrs. James Fuller Lord) last June, an outdoor affair, was a fair-land of roses.

The ceremony today was held on the broad veranda, large enough to accommodate 300 guests, which runs along Dreamwood Hall, for 100 feet and overlooks the sea, and was chosen by the to-be-wedded couple for reasons best known to themselves. This veranda was completely enclosed for the occasion and the interior decorated in holly, pine and laurel, with flying white doves, and many hundred electric lights. In a loft, raised off by struts, were the musicians and in the centre of one side was a chance of white flowers for the ceremony, which was performed by the Rev. John W. Suter, pastor of the Church of the Epiphany in Winchester, who married both of Miss Lawson's sisters, and took place in the garden at Dreamwood.

The bride wore a white velvet princess gown, Dutch neck, embroidered in lilacs, seed pearl and silver thread, with a band of ermine at the neck and sleeves; a pearl net cap, with a white net veil bordered with point Venise lace. She carried an ivory prayer book, and her attendant was her youngest sister, Jean (Bunny) who wore white chiffon trimmed with pearl embroidery, and carried holly.

The best man was Daker Bush, 2nd; and the ushers Gordon Ware, Alexander Wetherill, Lawrence K. Lunt, Truscott Hudekoper, C. D. Moss, Frank Harding, Patrick Grant, 2nd.

Lays Foundation Stone for First Town Hall and Opens New Y. W. C. A. Building—Pays Tribute to Citizens.

Johannesburg, Dec. 14.—At 9.30 on the morning of Nov. 29 the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, accompanied by Princess Patricia left Sunningdale, courted by the famous Imperial Light Horse and drove at a walking pace through the Wanderers' grounds to the Market Square where the centenary of the laying of the foundation stone of the first Johannesburg town hall, was to take place.

The centre of the square was converted to a pillared amphitheatre, every part of which was filled with people. The crowds in the remainder of the square were dense and even the roofs were black with people. On the arrival of the royal party the National Anthem was sung by several thousands of white-robed children. The ceremony was preceded by the presentation of numerous addresses from the Johannesburg town council, the municipalities of the Transvaal, the chamber of mines, the chamber of commerce and others, all tendering to their royal highnesses the warmest welcome to the Witwatersrand. The duke replied in a single speech which was audible over the greater part of that immense gathering.

Proceeding to Jeppe street, his royal highness opened the new building of the Young Women's Christian Association, naming it according to an intimation received from Princess Christian, the patroness of the association, the Princess Christian House Club and Institute. Subsequently, under the guidance of Sir Hugh Lane, the royal party inspected and inaugurated the art gallery, at University Hall, where the pictures are temporarily housed, the Duke paid a high tribute to the public spirit which had brought Sir Hugh Lane, Otto Beit, Mr. Smuts, Councillor Hofmeyer, Mr. Neumann, Max Michaels and others to such self-sacrificing efforts and generous contributions on behalf of Johannesburg.

On emerging from the building the royal party was greeted with renewed outbursts of cheering, the warmth of the popular welcome being again shown at the garden party, which the royal visitors attended given by the admiral, Mr. Risik, in Joubert Park. The day ended by a reception given by the mayor in the Hotel Carlton, the whole city being illuminated.

The chimes in the Dreamwood tower were played before and after the wedding and after the reception following the ceremony there was a grand ball in the hall, to which, besides the other guests the bride had bidden all the farm folk, their families and friends, to the number of 350, a few of which was a "vaudeville" entertainment.

The dance programme was in limp white leather, labelled in gold "Dorothy's Wedding Day," and under each of the 24 numbers Mr. Lawson had written one or more stanzas. Preceding the order of dances Mr. Lawson wrote:

When today is dead
And Memory's thread
Is tangled and ragged and bare,
Mayhap from this shaft
May be pulled a leaf
That will waken the way back
There—
That will waken again
The gladsome refrain
Of our Dorothy's wedding dance.

The wedding waltz tripped off with the following:

A Christmas bride and a bonnie bride,
And the bride and groom,
A comely lad and a lucky lad,
And a wedding by the sea.

A Giant Christmas Tree.

The evening festivities included also a giant Christmas tree for a farm children, hung with a hundred and odd about stockings filled to the brim with things dear to the kids.

The guests from Boston went down to Dreamwood in a special train, which returned late in the evening. From the Dreamwood gate, where they alighted they were driven to Dreamwood in a distance of a mile and a quarter, through two borders of spruce and fir trees, with red and white electric lights hung within. When darkness fell myriad lights twinkled over all the thousand Dreamwood acres.
