GOOD WORK OF EVERYBODY'S CANDIDATE CON. WIGMORE FOR CITY COMMISSIONER

Reports Show Much Pro-
gress in Water and Sew-
erage Department—Made
Many Improvements.

In connection with the department of water and sewerage my aim has been to give the city ample fire protection, an adequate supply of water and proper sewerage," said Commissioner Wigmore to a Standard reporter yesterday. "In looking over the reports of the department for the last two years you will find that 8,747 additional feet of water mains were laid. Water mains were renewed to the extent of 14,650 feet and 7,110 feet of new service pipes were supplied.

By means of the new mains the pressure was greatly increased in different sections of the city but there is a great amount of work to be done before the water system of the city is put in proper shape. Some of the mains have been in place for fifty years and through corrosion have become of very little use. These we propose to renew as soon as the work can be done.

Renovations have to be paid for out of the maintenance fund and we have rushed the work wherever possible. The Douglas avenue and Millidge avenue sewers have been constructed and serve a district that has long been in need of these services. The Marble Cove sewer, which is being constructed at the present time will be a great benefit to the people of the North End and we hope that the Marble Cove will soon be one of the beautiful spots of the city. Instead of having sewage dumping into this body of water it will be carried to the main channel of the river.

In the West Side, too, much has been accomplished in the way of improvements and we hope to still further increase the water and sewerage services on that side of the harbor.

Taking the work of the department altogether there has been a decrease in expenses as well as an increase in the revenues. We hope to accomplish much more in the next two years."

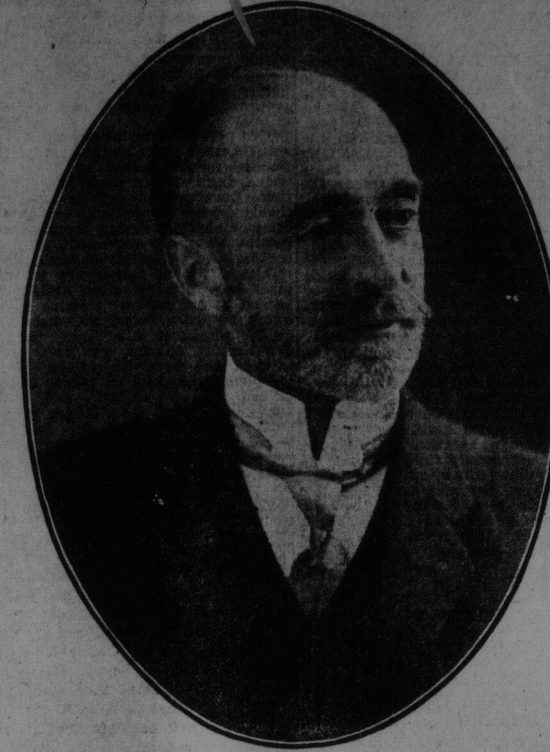

BANK OF B. N. A.

The Balance Sheet and Annual Report of the Bank of British North America, which has just completed its 78th year's business will be found on another page of this issue. Its net profits for the year amounted to \$689,745, and show a considerable increase over the earnings for the previous year. In many respects the year was a trying one to banking institutions, but the Bank of British North America emerged from the experience with increases in Reserve, Note Circulation and Net Profits. The Bank has total deposits of over \$38,000,000, and Current Loans and Discounts in Canada amount to over \$25,000,000. In addition the Bank has \$7,700,000, Current Loans elsewhere than in Canada and total Assets of \$62,644,000.

The Report for 1913 is the first complete one under the General Management of Mr. H. B. Mackenzie and indicates that the same conservative, sound and care which have always characterized this Bank will be continued. The past year's work shows good judgment through his taking care of the business needs of the communities in which the Branches of the Bank are located, and his discouragement of real estate speculation. His terse remarks on the general business conditions of the Dominion will be read with great interest.

Mr. E. A. Hoare, the Chairman, ably reviewed the Balance Sheet. He made a number of interesting comparisons and reminded those present that the compulsory audit, perhaps the most important feature of the new Canadian Bank Act was nothing new to The Bank of British North America, whose accounts had voluntarily submitted to outside audit regularly since 1889. 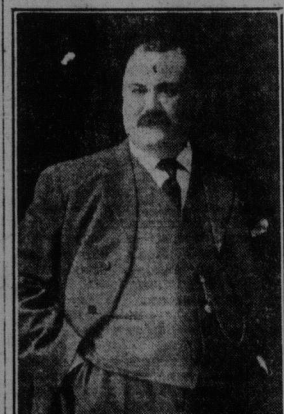


GEORGE FREDERICK FISHER.

THE LABOR CANDIDATE

Jas. L. Sugrue Advocates
Several Improvements in
Interests of the Citizens
—Endorsed by Unions.

Having been chosen by the labor organizations of the city of St. John, I will be a candidate at the ensuing civic elections. There are many reasons why a candidate representing directly the working people should be elected as a commissioner. The taxation system at present is considered by all classes of the community to be unjust, and should be revised. In dealing with the question of taxation the interests of the working people must necessarily be safeguarded. The question of increased hospital accommodation must also be in line for consideration, as at the present session of the legislature a bill was passed authorizing the municipality to issue bonds for \$200,000 to provide the nucleus of a fund to build a new public hospital. In view of the fact that the Sisters of Charity will soon open an up-to-date hospital on Hazen Avenue, it is an open question whether increased hospital accommodation will be required for some little time. If private individuals desire up-to-date medical appliances, operating rooms, etc., private individuals should pay the bill rather than the ratepayers of this city. We are told St. John is on the eve of an industrial development, great care should be exercised in the class of industries that are brought to the city of St. John, and no industry should be given any concession unless it is distinctly specified in the agreement between the city and the promoters of the industry that the wages paid the employees are adequate and fair, and the wages that prevail in like industries in other localities.

Proper housing accommodation for the working people is another proposition which should be considered; other cities and municipalities in different parts of the country have found it profitable to build homes for the working portion of the population, and the city of St. John could well afford to go into the question with the idea of providing proper housing accommodation for the working people. Our police department has recently received a very necessary shaking up, but for the life of me I do not understand how the citizens ever expect to have good moral men on the police force when they are required to patrol the streets twelve hours, day in and day out. Three eight-hour shifts in twenty-four hours would greatly improve the efficiency of the police force of this city. This same condition prevails in other civic departments and is a detriment to these departments. There are many other questions which will be dealt with by the Common Council of vital interest to the working people, and the Citizens' Committee who advocated Commission form of government wisely decided that there must necessarily be a commission at City Hall, representative of the working people. I would point out to the electors of the city, both ladies and gentlemen, that they have the opportunity of going to the polls on the 14th and 28th of April and voting for a candidate nominated and endorsed by all the labor organizations of this city.

If elected my aim and ambition will be to deal with all questions in the interests of the whole of the people of the city.
