London, July 25.—The report of the proposed visit of Canadian players to Scotland in the course of the 1914-1915 season was presented at the annual meeting of a representative committee of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club at Glasgow on Thursday. Invitations have been issued and accepted for the Canadian, Ontario and Manitoba branches to send eight players each, the Nova Scotia branch four players, and New Brunswick two players, a total of thirty. The selecting of the teams to play against Canada was left to a committee to be nominated by the general council.

NEW RECORD ON TURF AT CLEVELAND

Cleveland, Ohio, July 24.—On a slow track at the last day's meeting of the Grand Circuit races at North Randall, Thomas Murphy's Frank Bogash Jr. paced a mile in 2:01.4, three quarters of a second under Williams' mile of Tuesday. This again broke the North Randall track record and was the fastest mile paced this year. The feat was accomplished in the first heat of the championship pacing sweepstakes which Frank Bogash Jr. won in the first heat. The track was damp and looked very slow for the last day of the meet. It took seven heats to finish the 2:14 class. The class pacing event carried over from Thursday evening. Ella Mackay finally captured first money by winning the fourth and last two heats. R. P. Breat, winner of two of the three heats run Thursday, was the favorite, but had to be content with second money.

Guy Nello took the 2:21 class trotting event in three straight heats. Barbara Overton, who pressed Guy Nello hard in the last two heats, secured second. The 2:12 class trot went to Lucy Patchen, who took first and fifth heats. John Ruskin, who secured second money won the other two heats. The get-away event, a 2:06 class pace, was taken by Our Colonel, who won the last two of the four heats. Summary:

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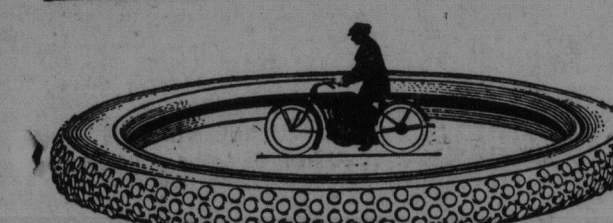

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CANADA HAS SIX MEN IN THE FINALS

Blaisy Camp, July 24.—Canada has now every prospect of making a showing in the King's prize competition fully up to the mark of last year.

Brighter weather greeted the riflemen today the chief feature being the second stage of the King's prize. Fifteen Canadians, including two not on the team, participated in the range prizes. At the 200 yards range Col. Sergt. J. Stoddart, thirty-second place, won 21; Sergt. S. G. Bullock, thirty-fifth, received three shillings.

At 500 yards Private H. B. Falconer, twenty-third; Private E. A. Lowrey, twenty-seventh and Gunner A. D. Noble, thirty-first, each won sixteen shillings. At 600 yards, Lt. G. W. McLean was twenty-fourth and won 21; Gunner A. D. Noble, was thirty-second and received seventeen shillings. Among the special prizes Brown was fourth winning 22.

Scores at the 300 yards range, second stage of the King's prize, were: Sergt. J. H. Armstrong, Halifax, 43; Lt. A. Brooks, Okanagan Landing, 44; Sergt. Bullock, Toronto, 43; Private Morrison, 44; Private Falconer, Al. ma, 44; Private Hendry, Dundas, 47; Sergt. Laman, Halifax, 46; Private Lowry Guelph, 43; Q. M. S. D. McLean, Edmonton, 44; Lt. McLean, Hope, 44; Sergt. Martin, Calgary, 46; Gunner Noble, Montreal, 47; Color. Sergt. J. Stoddart, Hamilton, 46; Bos, 44.

The foregoing scores show Noble leading in the Canadian large aggregate with 146, and Stoddart and Martin tied for second place with 145 each.
