

# DECLARES GERMANY WILL CONTINUE TO HOLD OUT

## CHANCELLOR MICHAELIS SAYS GERMANY WILL MAKE NO PEACE OFFER, BUT WILL CONTINUE WAR

### In First Address to Reichstag He Upholds Country in All Its Acts and Places Blame for World Struggle on Great Britain

#### CHANCELLOR MORE OF BOURBON THAN EVEN DR. VON BETHMANN - HOLLWEG Is Staunch Upholder of Kaiserism and all His Murderous and Inhuman Methods of Warfare - Admits Food Conditions Bad

Copenhagen, July 20.—Dr. Michaelis, the new Imperial German chancellor, in his address to the Reichstag on Thursday afternoon declared his adherence to Germany's submarine campaign, asserting it to be a lawful measure justifiably adopted and adapted for shortening the war.

Dr. Michaelis opened his speech with a hearty tribute to Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the retiring imperial chancellor, whose work he said history would appreciate.

The chancellor declared that the war was forced upon unwilling Germany by the Russian mobilization and the submarine war was also forced upon Germany by Great Britain's illegal blockade starvation war.

"The faint hope that America at the head of the neutrals, would check Great Britain's illegality, he said, was vain, Germany's final attempt to avoid the extremity by a peace offer failed, and the submarine campaign was adopted. The submarines, he continued, had done all and more than had been expected and the false prophets who had predicted the end of the war at a definite time had done a disservice to the fatherland."

"Peace must offer the foundation of a lasting conciliation of nations," he said. "It must," he continued, "be expressed in your resolution prevent nations from being plunged into further enmity through economic blockade and provide a safeguard that the league in arms of our opponents does not develop into an economic offensive alliance against us. These aims may be attained within the limits of your resolution as I interpret it." (Cheers.)

## 75 NEWFOUNDLAND MEN, BELIEVED TO BE DEAD, ALIVE

### Relatives at Home Had Gone into Black Garb for Missing Ones.

St. Johns, Nfld., July 20.—Official messages from London today report that seventy-five Newfoundland soldiers, previously reported missing and the families of whom had abandoned them as dead, had gone into black garb on that account, are prisoners of war at Limburg, Germany.

## JUNKERS WIN BIG VICTORY

Lord Robert Cecil So Regards Address of Chancellor Michaelis.

London, July 20.—Commenting on the speech of Chancellor Michaelis, Lord Robert Cecil, minister of blockade, said today:—

"In the first place, it is a definite rejection of the formula of no annexations or indemnities. Secondly, the speech is a complete victory for the Junkers, a complete defeat for the democratic parties.

"To me it seems that the chancellor was astonishingly frank. He makes it clear as crystal that the Germans intend to carry on the war with the same old object, the same old methods. It is well for us of the Entente that we should know how the facts actually stand, and thus the speech undoubtedly will be of service to our cause.

"It is perhaps better to deal with a frank man like the new chancellor than with Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, who always cast a veil of hypocrisy around what militarist Prussia really intended doing."
