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DESPERATE FIGHTING CONTINUES IN BALKANS

No Quarter Given or Asked

Conflicting Reports About Struggle But It is Believed the Bulgarians Have Inflicted Disaster on Serbian Forces—Turkey Proposes to Attack Bulgars, Too.

(Canadian Press.) London, July 7.—The most important news from the seat of war today is the report, confirmed from Sofia, of the appearance of a large Bulgarian force at Veranin, threatening the Serbian line of retreat. Still more significant, as tending to confirm the belief that the Serbians are suffering defeat, is the announcement from Belgrade that only meagre reports are being received from the Serbian army headquarters and that the government has decided to publish reports only on alternate days.

REAL WAR MOVEMENTS FOR NAPADOGAN AREA

New Drilling Ground for New Brunswick Militia Inspected by Minister and Sir Ian Hamilton—Imperial Officer Has Highest Praise for St. John Garrison—Fine Turnout.
