Greeley's farm:

On Friday evening Dr. Greeley went to Tarrytown with Mr. John R. Stuart. He passed the night at Mr. Stewart's residence, and early on Saturday morning, accompanied by that gentleman and Mr. Alvin J. Johnson, drove over to Chappaqua, a distance of six miles. Once there the whole subject of conversation was farming. First the barn, Dr. Greeley's masterpiece of design, was inspected. Then the poultry yard, agricultural implements, and everything, even to the dog house, was examined.

From the upper loft these sides are taken by the japaners to the patent leather room in the third story. This room is 50 feet long and 25 wide and 12 high and there are five ovens in it (heated by the steam engine) capable of holding 200 sides. There the sides are taken on light frames and receive two coats of the patent composition, and set out to dry in the open air, after that they receive the finishing coat, and are dried in ovens heated to 100°, from examined.
