The attorney-general, Hon. W. F. Nickle, K.C., has received from the printers samples of the ballot which has been ordered for use in the O. T. A. plebiscite on Thursday, October 23 next. A copy of the ballot, as it will be given to the voter on plebiscite day, is reproduced below. The government's instructions to the voter are to mark a cross opposite the question which he or she favors and to do nothing further. The voter is simply to vote affirmatively on one proposition and to express no opinion upon the other.
