What are way letters.

LVI. Way letters are those which have been received or sent by a Mail Courier, and which are not included in the mail, but handed to the Courier to be posted at the nearest Office.

How way letters with.

LVII. Postmasters receiving such letters will are to be dealt stamp and tax them according to the scale; and which amount, if for his own delivery, he will insert in the quarterly way account, and mark the word "Way" in red on the front of the letters; but if they should not be for his own delivery, and are consequently to be sent "forward" by him, they must be charged with the postage to the place of destination (the word "way" being also written on them in red ink), and stamped in the ordinary manner.
