Your entire letter is interesting and encouraging. You need never have the least fear as to my supporting you in the great endeavour upon which you have launched. It was of course inevitable that I should have to stand a degree of abuse over it, but I have used every interview to strengthen your own hands and to spread everywhere my confidence in you. If ever I have anything to say along the other line the first one to whom I will express it will be yourself.
