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SAYS BREMEN SPAKED ONLY BY BRITAIN'S O.K.

Conservative M.P. Sure Gov-
ernment Decided It
Should Be So

Parliament's not sitting "these last few months" was called "a crying shame," by Denton Massey, M.P. speaking to Woodbine-Greenwood Conservative association last night.

"I have no patience with carping ignorant criticism," he said. "But I think it a crying shame that the parliament of this Dominion has not been in session these last few months", if only to dissipate rumors.

Although war problems and the prosecution of the war to a successful conclusion, come first Mr. Massey said domestic problems should not be ignored, and preparation should be made for peace when it comes and the fulfilment of Canada's destiny as a great nation within the British Empire.

Speaking of recent news events, he suggested: "If the Bremen reached Germany, I only know it was because it was decided in Britain that she should reach Germany. Why I don't know. And I'm not going to criticize anything about which I don't know."

The association elected John Duncan to head a drive for membership.

Ald. Walter Howell opposed the Hepburn government's determination to override public opinion to try to force two-year councils for the duration of the war on municipalities.

Urging a public vote in favor of the sewage disposal question on New Year's Day, he said it was simply by the grace of God and the ability of Toronto's municipal waterworks staff that there had not been an epidemic from sewage-contaminated water here.
